

New Field Archery Range Being Built Near Dallas

DALLAS, May 20 (Special)—A new standard 14-target field archery range is being completed near here and will soon be available to archers, according to E. W. Grant, 611 Cherry St., Dallas. The range is located 4 1/2 miles from Dallas on the Liberty road and is on 20 acres of field and wooded land donated by C. D. Palm of Dallas.
