

County to Delay Move to City School Building

Marion county departments in the courthouse probably will not be moved to the Salem school administration building until after next January 1, according to County Judge Grant Murphy. Even though the special tax levy of \$350,000 to speed construction was passed by the voters Friday, contracts for construction of a new courthouse can not be let until after July 1, 1951.

Unless and until more satisfactory quarters can be acquired, however, the health department will remain in the Masonic temple. Its tax levy for a new building failed of approval. There is not sufficient vacant room in the school building for the health department along with other offices. Murphy said the rental from the school district, \$1,018.87 per month on a stand-by basis, is cheap enough to retain the school rooms unoccupied while keeping offices at the more convenient downtown site. The county's lease with the school district is for two years from July 1.

As to other out-of-courthouse departments, Murphy said present rental for the district attorney and school superintendent in the Pacific building is low enough that moving them would not bring a saving. Plans for the district court and constable, now in the Gray building, are uncertain. Murphy said their rent is satisfactory, but adequacy of their quarters will be checked.

Early next year the court will take steps to dispose of the 75-year-old courthouse, either by sale or salvage. After the final \$75,000 levy within the 8 per cent limitation is placed on the 1951-52 tax roll, contracts may be awarded for the new \$1,500,000 structure. General plans already have been approved by a courthouse commission, and the architect, Pietro Belluschi of Portland, is preparing working drawings.

1949-50 Bull Market Grows Fat 'n Sassy

NEW YORK, May 20 — (AP) — The 1949-50 bull stock market grew fat and sassy this week. The market's diet was rich: excellent reports of current business operations and unusually optimistic appraisals of the future by private and public experts. In addition the market digested a sizeable dose of inflationary tonic.

For five days running the market, on average, broke into new high ground since July, 1946. Not in two years has it surged ahead, with more strength. When the closing bells sounded at noon Saturday, the quoted value of all stocks listed on the exchange had increased by nearly \$2,000,000 during the week.

Saturday's market was a tame affair with most of the gains scored during an opening flurry of buying. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 1.1 of one point to 79.2, which compared with 77.3 a week earlier.

Sales of 900,000 shares contrasted with 570,000 a week ago, which was one of the slowest short sessions of the year.
