

Development For Airport To Be Delayed

Defeat of a Salem airport millage tax will postpone a planned extension of the main runway and installation of high intensity lighting, City Manager J. L. Franzen said Saturday.

The airport tax was voted down by Salem voters Friday, but five other fund-raising measures for city works were approved.

City Manager Franzen expressed satisfaction that the five approved issues will get the administration off to a "good start" on its recently drafted 10-year plan for city development.

He pointed out that defeat of the airport tax will not prevent completion of the first part of the city airport administration building this year. The building is now under construction.

The defeated tax (at 2.6 mills) would have raised about \$150,000 over two years, with this local money slated to be matched by federal airport funds.

Defeat of the tax will lose to Salem, at least for the time being, a \$90,000 federal airport fund which had already been allocated tentatively for work at Salem, provided the city put up its own matching funds by this June 1.

Other Issues Approved

The civil aeronautics administration periodically makes tentative allocations, by cities, as it prepares or revises its budget.

Approved by Salem voters were a one-year tax to buy a new pumper and aerial ladder truck for the fire department and bond issues to complete the sewage disposal system, establish new drainage, replace and repair bridges and construct reservoirs and make other water supply improvements.

Two Officials Are Recalled

ASHLAND, May 20—(AP)—This recall center of Oregon recalled two more city officials yesterday. Leaving office this time are Mayor Thomas S. Williams, who lost in a 1900-to-1225 vote, and Councilman Elmer Sheldon, who lost by 1544 to 946. The city council will name replacements.

Linn County Turns Down Road Levy

ALBANY, May 20 — A proposed five-mill levy to finance county road repairs was defeated 4,882 votes to 4,662 in the Linn County special election, a complete count showed today.

Mayor Elfstrom Pleased with Approval of Financial Issues

Mayor R. L. (Bob) Elfstrom broke into a big smile Saturday at the inevitable question: "What'd you think of city election results?" He was downright pleased over the voters' approval for five of six Salem financial measures.

He was affable, but guarded, over the fate of candidates on the city ballot.

Now in his fourth year as Salem mayor, Elfstrom had declined to run for reelection and had made no endorsement of city candidates.

"There were three good men running for mayor and one of them had to lose out this time," Elfstrom commented on the primary result which puts Harry V. Collins and Alfred W. Loucks into a runoff election in November after eliminating Walter Musgrave.

And the way it looked to him Saturday, the present mayor wasn't about to endorse any candidate in November, either.

"I'm no would-be kingmaker," said Elfstrom.

In the only aldermen's contests, two wards returned to the city council Thomas Armstrong and Albert H. Gilie who have been serving on the city council which Elfstrom heads as mayor.

On the subject of the financial measures, Elfstrom interpreted the vote as "public acceptance of our city's long range plan."

The voters approved four bond issues and a special tax, and rejected only a proposed airport improvement tax.

"Fact that our voters singled out one issue to oppose," reasoned Elfstrom, "leads me to think they really considered each of the issues on its own merits."

McMinnville Mayor Loses Over Parking

McMINNVILLE, May 20 — A hot controversy over parking in downtown McMinnville was decided today.

A write-in candidate, Dr. W. H. Barendrick, defeated R. H. Windishar, McMinnville mayor for 17 years, 1,015 to 855, and voters balloted 1,118 to 898 to defeat an ordinance proposed by Windishar which would have banned parking along Baker street, a main street.

Elliott B. Cummings, jr., McMinnville, and Carl Francis, Dayton attorney and state representative for three terms, were nominated by republicans as state representative. They polled 2,795 and 2,589 votes, respectively. Harry F. Williams of Carlton received 2,162 votes.

In the democratic race for the house of representatives, Guy Shumway of McMinnville, only name on the ballot, was checked 1,377 times out of about 2,700 democratic votes cast. While so many names were written in that the tally had not been completed, it appeared that Dean Holmes, Sheridan publisher, would be the second democratic candidate for the legislature.

Going down to defeat by a narrow margin was a proposed \$7,500,000 bond issue to finance county road construction and repairs. The vote was 4,055 to 3,964.

Suicide Blast Destroys House

NEW YORK, May 20—(AP)—Dependent over the death of her adopted son, a 70-year old widow turned on the gas jets in her kitchen early Friday and sat down to wait for death.

It came spectacularly. A thunderous explosion demolished her four-room apartment, jarred the upper east side, showered a block of Lexington avenue with glass and debris, and drove hundreds of frightened neighbors into the street.

Police identified the dead woman as Mrs. Emma Heidelberg.

Special Vote At Falls City Cancelled Out

DALLAS, Ore., May 20 — The city of Falls City failed to set up proper election machinery for its special vote on a charter amendment and Park Calkins, an election board chairman, was within his rights when he refused to distribute the city ballot, according to a ruling today by R. S. Kreason, Polk county district attorney.

Kreason stated that the council in Falls City had failed to designate the special election and had failed to provide poll books.

The amendment would revise the city charter along the lines of a model charter of the League of Oregon Cities.

Since Falls City precincts include both rural and city voters, the board had no way without city poll books of determining who was eligible to vote.

The special election was voided when Calkins refused to give out city ballots. The regular primary election was handled without incident by the Falls City boards.
