

Prizes Given in Jersey Show's Junior Section

Top winners in the junior division of the Marion County Jersey Cattle show held Monday at the state fairgrounds were: Junior heifer class, John Lee; senior heifer calf, Donna Lee Klein; junior yearling heifer, Lenthall Kapp; senior yearling heifer, Donna Lee Klein; producing cow class, Vernon Vogt.

In the open classes, Rex Ross, Mt. Angel took both firsts in the younger bulls, with his Crowing Designer, Aristocrat, winning top in the senior bull calves, and Les Pieces Golden Crown in the junior yearlings. D. C. Brook, Salem took top in the two year old bulls on Gribble Checkered Gregg, and L. L. Lee in the aged bulls on Lemonation Double Alm.

Wins Top Ribbon

Imported Little Design, as fine a Jersey cow as has been seen in Marion county show ring for a long time, brought the blue and purple ribbons in her division to Floyd and Leta Bates of Salem. Ross entries dominated the two top places in the cows for four years and under five, as well as two top places in the three year olds.

D. C. Brook, took first in the two year olds, and Ross again topped the class with Lynn's Crowing Designer, in the senior yearling group. The Designer blood was favorite at the show, not only with the judge but drew much attention from the ringside. Three daughters of Lynn's Crowing Designer headed the junior yearling class and another trip with the same sire, headed the senior heifer class.

A 4-H clubber broke the monotony and headed the junior heifer class of 13 entries. John Lee, showing his junior champion 4-H heifer in his first year beat out the veteran Ross, who was contented with second on still another Designer daughter.

Hold Top Places

Rex Ross held both top places in the production cows with production records of 500 pounds or better butterfat. Floyd and Leta Bates were third; the Boys Training school at Woodburn, fourth, and Martin and Nell Knittel & Son, Astoria, fifth in this important division.

Ross took top places in the group classes, including production of dam on Valiant Loretta; Junior Get of Sire on Imported Lynn's Crowing Designer and senior get of sire on Lion Farm Come Son Jr.

The show committee included Neal Miller, Rex Ross and Calvin Mikkelsen. Mrs. L. L. Lee headed the dinner committee, and assisting in the ring were T. R. Hobart of Ladd & Bush Salem Branch of the United States National Bank, and Ben A. Newell, Marion county extension livestock agent.

Hot-Rod Entry Awe Racers

INDIANAPOLIS, May 22—(AP)—That little white car that has been coughing and wheezing around the Indianapolis motor speedway for two weeks, made a lot of know-it-alls look twice today.

With Dick Rathman of Alhambra, Calif., at the wheel, the "City of Glendale," qualified at an average of 130.928 miles an hour for the 10-mile distance.

The car might well be called "the credit man's special." It was built by two Glendale, Calif., hot-rod enthusiasts with ingenuity, borrowed money, spare parts and a goodly quantity of perspiration.

The builders, A. J. Watson and Joe Mastro, didn't even have the \$250 entry fee. That was put up by Joe Novelli, Long Beach, Calif., president of the Ben Hur Racing company. Novelli became interested in Watson and Mastro when, one day a few months ago, they zoomed past his huge limousine with one of their hot-rod.

Rathman, a freshman driver, is the brother of Jim Rathman who drove at the speedway last year. He took the "City of Glendale" around the 2½-mile track with a terrific ride. Accelerating far into the turns, Rathman took the first lap at 129.683 and improved each time around. His best lap was the last at 131.830.

Lie's Visit to Moscow Said 'Profitable'

LAKE SUCCESS, May 22—(AP)—General Trygve Lie's visit to Moscow earlier this month was reported tonight to have been "very profitable."

The report was contained in a message to U.N. headquarters here from the U.N. information office in Paris. Referring to a trip French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman made to Nantes yesterday for a political rally, the message quoted Schuman as having told newsmen aboard the train:

"Mr. Trygve Lie's trip to Moscow has been very profitable. I had... in my office a man (Lie) who had at last again become an optimist. This is an impression which is comforting..."

"One must not rejoice too easily, but at this time I have the pleasure of noting an unhoping for lessening of tension. Three weeks ago, only, we found ourselves at a dead end, the specter of war dominated the world, the situation was disappointing. Well, we have scored some points. I hope we shall score more."

In the course of a "save-the-U.N." mission, Lie has been conferring with top officials of the major powers including President Truman. In Moscow he talked with Prime Minister Stalin and other Soviet leaders. He called on Schuman on his return to Paris from the Soviet capital. Lie expects to arrive in New York Thursday and wants to confer again with President Truman next week.

Lie has been reticent thus far in his public comments on what progress, if any, he has made in easing east-west tensions.

Rattler's Bite Proves Fatal

REDMOND, May 22—(AP)—A rattlesnake bit a vacationing Floridian near here Saturday. The man died in a hospital yesterday.

He was Ralph Edward Shaff, 61, Clearwater, Fla., who was fishing with his wife and some friends in the Crooked river canyon.

Shaff threw a rock and hit a rattlesnake they came across. Thinking the snake dead, he reached for it. The snake struck his hand.

Friends carried him up the steep canyon, but it was some time before he reached the hospital. He died the next day.

University Puts 25 Students On Probation

EUGENE, Ore., May 22—(AP)—The University of Oregon tonight announced 25 students had been placed on probation on admission of membership in a banned secret fraternity.

Donald M. Dushane, director of students affairs, said the students had signed affidavits that they were members of Theta Nu Epsilon, a secret fraternity long banned by many colleges. The probation period extends for the length of their college careers here, Dushane said.

The fraternity's members were charged last week with fomenting a demonstration during campus political rallies. The near riot was quelled when firemen turned water hoses on the students.

Dushane said probation was issued because the members had cooperated in breaking up the organization here. He said the university was prepared to go further, expulsion of the students if necessary, to halt the activities of the fraternity.

R. V. Nelson President of Appraisers

Robert V. Nelson was elected president of the Salem chapter of the Society of Residential Appraisers at a meeting Monday night. Robert Powell was elected first vice president; William Goodwin, second vice president; and John E. Black, secretary-treasurer.

Powell, principal speaker for the evening, discussed current construction costs and gave a breakdown on actual costs and contract bids on several houses which have been built recently. He indicated that actual costs of residential properties are about five per cent below the 1948 peak though the tone remains firm.

Truman Scolds Russians for Boycotting U.N.

WASHINGTON, May 22—(AP)—Criticizing Russia for what he called a "wilful flouting" of the United Nations charter, President Truman said today a strengthened UN—backed by a more powerful west—will speed the day when the Soviets will make and keep agreements.

While Mr. Truman did not discuss the issues raised by Soviet demands that Red China be admitted to the world organization, it was learned that the western powers have decided against throwing open the door at this time.

Responsible officials who could not be named said such a decision was reached at London by the big three foreign ministers.

The decision can be expected to result in the indefinite continuation of the Soviet bloc's boycott of sessions of U.N. agencies at which Nationalist China is represented.

It was this boycott which Mr. Truman termed a "wilful flouting" by the Soviet government of obligations assumed by it under the UN charter.

He told congress that in the sensibly proceeding with business face of this boycott the U.N. is as usual.

Draft Revival Said Possibility

INDIANAPOLIS, May 22—(AP)—A slump in military recruiting may force a return to inductions under the peacetime draft law, Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey said today.

Gen. Hershey, who directs selective service, said no new inductions will be ordered, however, until congress acts on extension of the draft law beyond June 24.

He said manpower experts in Washington are worrying about the recent declines in enlistments.

SOMOZA VICTORIOUS

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, May 22—(AP)—Returns from the presidential election today showed the liberal party had won in at least seven of the 15 departments, and President Anastasio Somoza claimed victory by a wide margin.

Multnomah Budget Slized By \$1 Million

PORTLAND, May 22—(AP)—The Multnomah county commissioners today lopped almost a million dollars off the county budgets in the wake of a special tax levy defeat by the voters.

The tax above the 6 per cent limitation would have provided \$2,443,000 of the tentative \$10,695,000 fiscal 1950-51 budget. It is doubted the full amount of the defeated levy can be slashed from the budget.

Reductions listed today cut off \$223,357 from road work, \$15,039 from the city-county mosquito control program, \$58,000 planned for a new morgue, \$60,000 for a cemetery administration building, about \$90,000 set aside for possible wage increases and juvenile court and home plans amounting to about \$100,000.

Eugene Traffic Death Involves Liquor Charge

EUGENE, May 22—(AP)—State police today arrested the owner of a car that plunged onto a lawn and killed one girl and injured a sister. A 15-year-old boy had been driving.

Police charged Gerald Lewis Hempel, 24, Eugene, with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, Texlee Hendricks, 15, Springfield. The boy, who was driving, has been charged with negligent homicide.

Police accused Hempel with giving the young boy liquor prior to the accident. The car owner's bail was set at \$2,800. The boy is held by juvenile authorities under \$1,000 bail.

A coroner's inquest is scheduled Wednesday in the death of Barbara Joan Paul. Her sister, Jennette, 11, suffered leg and arm fractures when the car ran over them as they sunned in their yard Saturday.

Columbia Holds To High Level

PORTLAND, May 22—(AP)—The rising Columbia river stood a half-foot over flood stage of 15 feet at Vancouver, Wash., today. River experts said it probably would stay at about that level the next four days before inching higher.

Meanwhile, the Bonneville administration assured the region that the high water crest of 26 feet, forecast for mid-June, would not affect power production at either Grand Coulee or Bonneville dams.

Only if the river went as high as in 1948, when it reached 30 feet at Vancouver, would power production suffer, said John P. Jolliffe, chief of operations. At that crest, production would be cut 200,000 kilowatts, he said.

Sen. Morse Talks at Meet Of Red Cross

The furtherance of democratic principles depends to a great degree on the application of spiritual values, Senator Wayne Morse told members of the Marion county chapter, American Red Cross at the annual meeting Monday night.

Speaking on the subject "Spiritual values of Democracy and Our Foreign Policy," Morse said legislators must apply practical spiritual values to world affairs. He said our foreign policy is clearly outlined for the next 25 years and partisan ideas must be subjugated to the following of that outline.

Carlton Greider, YMCA membership secretary, gave a summary of the annual report of Red Cross activities in the county. He emphasized the organizations work in many fields and pointed particularly to the fact that most of the work is carried on through volunteer efforts.

Louisa Lamb reviewed activities of the Junior Red Cross in the county during the past year. Edith Fairham Gunnar sang two numbers. The Rev. Dudley Strain gave the invocation.

All 149-50 directors were re-elected for another year.

Truman Points To 'Defects' In Basin Bill

WASHINGTON, May 22—(AP)—President Truman told congress today there was a "serious defect" in the recently approved \$17,000,000,000 rivers and harbors authorization bill with respect to the Columbia river basin.

He said the "defect" in the act, which he signed last week, was in the fact that it authorized only the army engineer projects for the Columbia river basin.

In an 1,800-word message to congress, he chided the legislative body for taking what he termed a "piecemeal approach" to the problem of developing the nation's water resources.

He said that in a number of instances congress gave primary responsibility for such work to the corps of army engineers and failed to give proper consideration to other interested government agencies and to the states themselves.

He said the bill also omitted any provision for a "basin account," which would be designed to permit unified physical and financial operation of projects in the Columbia basin.

Salem's Fire Loss Lower Than Average

NEW YORK, May 22—(Special)—The record of fire prevention and control achieved in Salem during 1949 proved to be better than that turned in by most cities in the United States in the plus-20,000 population class. The findings are based on a survey of 502 cities just completed by the National Fire Protection association.

Salem ended the year with a fire loss totaling \$105,846, the result of 356 building fires. The local fire department's effectiveness is indicated by the fact that these fires were brought under control quickly and damage was held to a minimum.

The average loss per fire locally was \$294, comparing favorably with the other cities, whose average loss was \$674 per fire.

Per capita, the fire damage in Salem amounted to \$1.98, against the average of \$3.11 found in the other cities.

Automobile fires also kept the nation's fire departments busy. They constituted nearly a fourth of all fires. In Salem they totaled 52 for the year.

A decline was noted during the year, reports the NFPA, in the number of "malicious" false alarms turned in. Such alarms, distinguished from honestly made false alarms dropped from 8.1 to 7.7 per cent of the total calls. In Salem, of the 569 calls received by the fire department, eight were classified as malicious false alarms.

Peru Clears Quake Damage

CUZCO, Peru, May 22—(AP)—Earthquake relief crews dug scores of bodies from the dusty, tumbled stones of this city's ancient relics today and sought to bring aid to the homeless.

Luis Tapayachi, chief of the police investigation section, said 40 bodies had been recovered and that the death list from Sunday's quake would mount to at least 60.

Among ruined and damaged structures in this oldest city of Peru were some of the most famous churches and massive walls of ancient Inca civilization and its Spanish conquerors.
