

Brovia Slams Two to Lead Beavers To Victory in Los Angeles Nightcap

Baumholtz's String Halted

Lynn's Shut-Out Win Gives Portland Split

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—(AP)—Frankie Baumholtz went hitless for the first time in 34 games today as his Los Angeles Angels split a Pacific Coast league double header with Portland.

Red Lynn shut out the Angels, 0 to 0, in the seven inning finale with a four hitter. Los Angeles took the opener, 4 to 2.

Joe Brovia's grand slam homer highlighted a seven run Portland rally with two away in the fifth inning of the second game. All the runs were unearned, however, because of a bobble by Albie Glossop at third base.

Then, in the final frame, Brovia belted another round tripper—his 16th this season—with Mickey Rocco on base.

The triumph was Lynn's seventh this year against one defeat. Baumholtz, the pink checked Los Angeles outfielder, blooped a single in the first game, the 33rd in which he has hit safely. Lynn stopped him cold in the afterpiece, though.

At San Diego three home runs helped Hollywood to an 8 to 3 win over San Diego in the first game of a double-bill, but pitcher George Zuverink blanked the visitors 4 to 0 in the nightcap.

At San Francisco the Seals swept a doubleheader with Seattle, outlasting the Rainiers 12 to 6 in the opener and taking the nightcap 8 to 7 on first baseman Les Fleming's three-run homer in the last half of the seventh and final inning.

Three Under Par ... Slammin' Sammy Adds Colonial Tourney Title

FORT WORTH, Tex., May 28.—(AP)—Sam Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., golf's leading man, added another choice trophy to his bulging collection today as he snapped up a \$3,000 check for winning the \$15,000 Colonial National Invitation tournament. He finished with 277 for the 72-holes—three under par.

The top runner in everything golf has to offer—most money won, most Ryder cup points and top contention for the Vardon trophy—shot a three-over-par 73 over Colonial Country club's troublesome 7,035-yards in the final round today.

Big Skip Alexander of Knoxville, Tenn., closed out with a 70 to win second money of \$2,000 with a 72-hole total of 280. He did it as Ed Oliver of Seattle, Wash., who was second at the end of the third round yesterday, faltered badly, taking a 74 to wind up with 283 and a tie with Cary Middlecoff of Ormond Beach, Fla., for fifth place. Oliver picked up \$850.

Snead's winnings today put him over the \$20,000 mark in money earned for the year. He now has \$20,728 and a long lead in winnings.

Oliver, golf's round man, had a chance to overtake Snead until he ran into No. 13 where he plunged two over par. He got into a trap on his second shot, took two to get out and two-putted for a five. That ended his threat. He was even par at the time of his troublesome hole. "Well, that's golf," he said. Ed had started the day's round five strokes back of Snead.

E. J. Harrison, of St. Andrews, Ill., and Ben Hogan of Hershey, Pa., divided third and fourth place, money receiving \$1,200 each. Harrison had a 72 and Hogan a 70 today as they closed out with 282.
