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Old Fashioned

Meat Loaf is Good Eating, and Old Time Recipes Can be Made Modern

When you get right down to it, meat loaf is mighty good eating, and it's one of the least expensive of good meats.

Chuck beef, flank or round steak or a trusted brand are good economy meats for grinding. They have the right amount of fat and will make a good meat loaf.

For a juicy and flavorful loaf ask the meat man to put the trimmed meat through the grinder with a coarse blade, only once. Meat that is put through the grinder 2 or 3 times loses moisture and flavor rapidly. In fact, to insure its original full-flavored goodness wise homemakers use up ground meat within 2 days of purchase.

Some folks like to form ground meat into individual patties or irregular mounds for oven baking that brings a crusty brown top. Others roll or pack the meat into shapely loaves and ring molds that glorify everyday service, and invite a fruit or vegetable filling.

Everyday meat loaf gets a brand new point of view when flattered with fruit in this suggestion. To make, combine your favorite meat loaf ingredients and mix well. This takes but a few minutes, but if you like, you can mix the loaf in the morning, wrap and chill in the refrigerator and bake in time for dinner.

Now shape the meat mixture evenly around a large baking banana—completely covering the fruit to make a compact loaf. Place the loaf on a baking sheet and bake slowly in a moderate oven (350 degrees) about an hour or so for juicy goodness. Cut in thick slices and serve piping hot.

Because meat loaf is so versatile you can vary the service to fit the occasion. When it comes to giving your favorite ground meat mixture a fiesta sparkle, try this suggestion. Pack the meat loaf mixture into a ring mold that has a circle of pineapple chunks and brown sugar arranged on the bottom. Bake the loaf as usual and serve—upside down, of course—with a center of creamed peas or new potatoes as a grand filip.

Tailor-made for budget eating, meat loaf becomes a real penny saver when you combine it with vegetable left-overs as in this recipe for Beef Pinwheels.

Here seasoned mashed potatoes and peas provide a flavorful meat filling that stretches a pound of meat to serve six.

Slice and serve pretty beef pinwheel with grilled tomato halves, buttered carrot slices and hot oven rolls for hit-the-spot fare that flatters the cook as well as the budget.

BEEF PINWHEELS

| 1 pound ground beef | 6 tablespoons bread crumbs |
| 1 1/2 teaspoons salt | 2 tablespoons tomato juice |
| 1/2 teaspoon pepper | 1 1/2 cups mashed potatoes |
| 1 egg | 1 1/2 cups seasoned mashed peas |
| 2 tablespoons melted fat | |
- Mix together all ingredients except potatoes and peas. Roll with rolling pin between 2 pieces of waxed paper to form rectangular sheet 1/4-inch thick. Remove top waxed paper and spread with mashed potatoes and crosswise half of meat. Spread other half with mashed peas. Roll meat firmly, jelly roll fashion. Wrap in waxed paper and chill several hours. Bake in a shallow pan in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 1 hour. To serve, slice into 6 1-inch slices.

Plastic Aprons in New Designs Are Attractive, Are Pressed by Hanging

Plastic aprons are a handy item to have in your kitchen, but too often they are shown in unattractive styles or in a type of plastic that does not wear well for heavy use. Now, a new collection of aprons has come on the market in a vinyl film plastic that can be "pressed" by hanging them in a steamy room. In fact, you can freshen up these models by hanging them over a bowl of hot water and in a few minutes they are free of wrinkles.

What is even more important, I think, is that the styles are most attractive and they are cut with plenty of material for comfort and fashion. For general wear, there is a cover up style that will cover the top of your dress as well as the entire front of your skirt. It is gathered at the waistline and has a ruffle all around the bodice and the hemline. The pocket is a gathered half-circle with a bow for a delicate touch. The aprons are of solid plastic and the ruffles of a gay design.

Another very handy apron in this collection is a small apron that fits just over the front of the skirt. It has a pocket the width of the front with holes at either side so you can fill it with either pins, or with tools or seeds when you work in your garden. It is a good accessory for work hours around your home.

A third apron is a half-size affair to cover the full length of your skirt and has two large side pockets and panels of solid and printed plastic for style. The patterns on these plastic aprons are most cheerful in floral or conversation piece designs and come in red, yellow, green or blue. The price is so moderate, they make excellent gifts, in sets of three, for hostesses or for shower gifts.
