

Duke Snider Powers Bums to Lead; 73,728 See Yanks Bop Bosox Twice

Fielder Hits Three Homers

Cards Win Double Nod But Phillies Drop 2

NEW YORK, May 30 (AP)—Duke Snider's home-run bat powered the Brooklyn Dodgers back into first place in the National league today, while their world series foes—the New York Yankees—whipped the Boston Red Sox twice to solidify their lead in the American league.

Brooklyn, with Snider hitting three homers in the second game, edged the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-6 and 6-4, in a morning-after-

noon Memorial day doubleheader at Ebbets field. The two defeats dropped Philadelphia from first to third place.

A crowd of 34,700 held its collective breath as Snider missed a fourth home run by only four feet his last time up. The blow, which hit the right field screen, went for a single.

Granville Hamner's bad throw gave the Dodgers the winning run in the tenth inning of the morning game. Home runs also featured this contest. Mike Gollat, Fitchie Ashburn and Dick Sisler found the range for Philadelphia, while Jack Robinson and Roy Campanella connected for Brooklyn.

A crowd of 73,728—second largest of the season—saw the Yankees increase their advantage to three games over Detroit by whipping the Red Sox, 11-7 and 8-3. The Yanks knocked out Mel Parnell with a five-run blast to take the opener. Joe Collins then highlighted a two-run rally in the eighth inning of the second game to give the New Yorkers their margin.

The St. Louis Cardinals climbed over the Phillies into second place with a double victory over Pittsburgh, 17-13 and 8-5. While the Cards got 30 hits, Stan Musial, the National league's leading hitter, managed only one—an inside-the-park homer in the ninth inning of the second game. Musial had one hit in ten at bat, his average dipping from .442 to .415. He batted in five runs, however.

After pushing across seven runs in the eighth inning to insure the opener, the Cardinals rallied for six runs in that same inning to take the nightcap. Nanny Fernandez hit two homers for Pittsburgh in the opener.

The Boston Braves and New York Giants split a doubleheader. Johnny Sain's five-hitter gave Boston a 7-2 victory in the opener. Larry Jansen stopped the Braves with six hits in the nightcap, 1-3.

The Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds divided their doubleheader. The Cubs took the second game, 7-4, after losing the opener, 4-1.

In the American league home runs by Fitchie, Bob Hooper and Sam Chapman featured Philadelphia's 5-1 victory over Washington after Sam Mele's three-run homer aided Washington in taking the opener, 4-3.

The Chicago White Sox slammed out 38 hits to humble the St. Louis Browns, 12-9 and 14-2. Detroit divided with Cleveland, winning the second game, 5-2, behind Hal Newhouser's five-hit pitching after dropping the opener to Bob Lemon, 4-0.

The amount of money that Parsons will be enriched by this victory will not be known until the drivers' victory dinner tomorrow night. Presumably he will bag around \$50,000.

The experts agreed Parsons would have won the race even if it had gone the scheduled 500 miles. He started under a handicap because a slight crack was discovered in the cylinder block of his car. Parsons made only one stop of a minute and 34 seconds at 262 miles to replenish his fuel and change tires. Rose also had only one stop. His car was threatened by fire when a spark from the exhaust ignited gasoline a mechanic was pouring into the tank.

Attendants quickly showered clouds of chemical fire extinguisher over the car and under it, but there was no serious damage. The car did not catch fire, but the mechanic's pants did. He jumped over the low retaining wall and by the time he reached the other side he was in his under shorts.

There is little doubt that Parsons' triumph was deserving. He finished second in last year's 500-mile race and went on from there to win the National AAA driving championship. Today's venture was only his second start at the speedway.

It was the second time that rain stopped the race before the 500-mile distance had been completed. In 1926 Frank Lockhart was in first place when rain caused the event to be stopped at 400 miles.

The Cummins Diesel Special, only oil burner and only care with more than four cylinders in the race, went out after 130 miles. A sheared shaft on the supercharger stopped the diesel. The people who mattered most to the newest speedway champion got to Victory Lane after he did, delayed by rain and the unexpected end of the race. The rainy victory Whoop-Te-Do got off to a bad start. Guards trying to fight back the crowd caught the champ across the chin as he drove his winning car into the enclosure. The greeters, the newsmen and the photographers swarmed over the yellow car.

Somebody tried to give him a drink of milk, and he snoved it away impatiently. The 31-year-old Van Nuys, Calif., racer fidgeted, looking for his pretty wife.

The first likely prospect for a kiss was Harry Stephens, chief mechanic for Parsons' Wynn Friction Proof Special. He got it.

Then Barbara Stanwyck, the official champion-greeter, arrived after a sprint through the car pits. That brought the first smile from Parsons. The 1949 champion of American Automobile association racing fell to the job of accepting Stanwyck's greetings happily.

"I told you we'd do it," chanted the film star, still heavily made up for the scenes she'd been making for a racing movie with Clark Gable. She left his oil-splattered face well smeared with lipstick. At last, the champ's willowy, brown-eyed wife, Lila, 22, arrived from a grandstand. "I think he's wonderful," she caroled. "I hadn't expected him to win. I was hopin', I was hopin', though."
