Salem Plane Bound for Wyoming Task



Aerial war against Mormon crickets and grasshoppers will begin in a few days in Wyoming when the big dusting plane above goes into action. Top photo shows surplus B-18 bomber being loaded with sawdust to test a hurried conversion job necessary to adapt the plane from powder type of insecticides to the poisoned bran which will be used against the hopping horde. The plane was sold by Ace Flying service of Salem to T. E. Milley, Big Piney, Wyo., who is shown at left in smaller photo. At right is Rich Bauer, 2785 Brooks st., aviation mechanic, who will go with the B-18 to Wyoming. Approximately 450,000 acres will be covered by Milley with the B-18, carrying about four tons per trip. The men are standing in the hopper of the plane, formerly the bomb bay, and are holding drive shaft which turns a beater to scatter the bran. Milley says that 2,000,000 acres are to be treated by state and federal agencies in Wyoming in an attempt to halt the spread of the pests. (Statesman photos.)

Credit Group Alters Plans For Investment

Two steps to eliminate government interest in the Willamette Production Credit association were announced this week at a meeting of the group's board of directors. P. M. Brandt, jr., secretary-treasurer, pointed out that government investments in the association, which furnishes short-term financing for farmers, have been cut to \$40,000 from an original investment of \$250,000 in 1934.

In addition, the board of directors ended an agreement whereby investment of all capital funds was made in U. S. securities at par value by the government. Under the new authority the association has reinvested its capital funds at the current market value on securities.

Directors of the association include President John Ramage, Woodburn; E. A. McCormack, Seio; Claude Buchanan, Corvallis; George H. Fullenwider, Corvallis; and E. W. McMindes, Astoria.

The community-project show will be presented June 15, 16 and 17 at the state fairgrounds.



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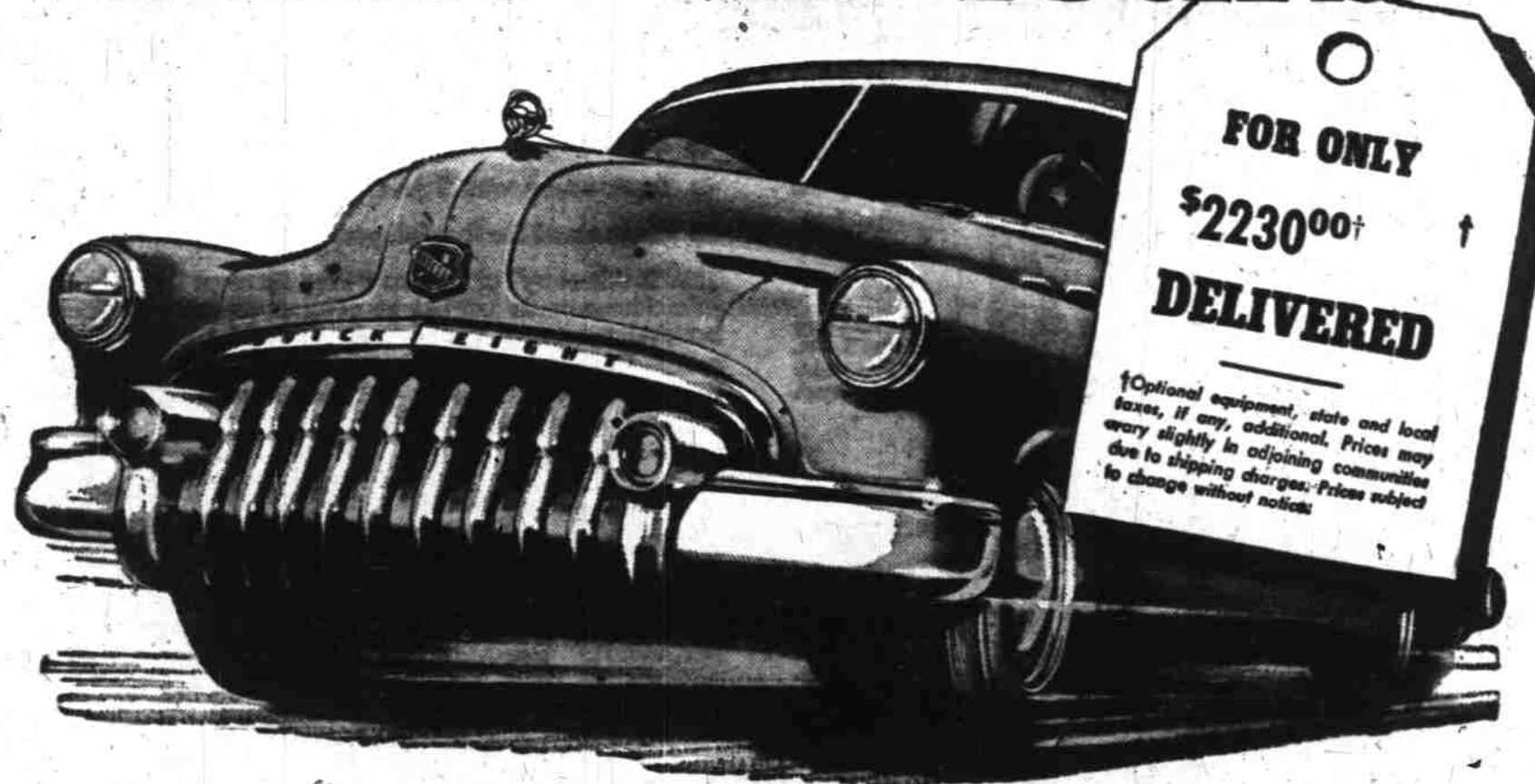

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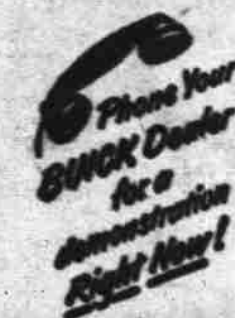
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
