Convention to Move to Salem

PORTLAND, June 1—(AP)—The 12th annual western states conference of machinists, set for Portland July 21-26, will be held in Salem instead.

That's because so few Portland hotels have union employees, explained Gus N. Stricker, executive secretary of the Oregon Machinists Council.

"It certainly is a blow to our civic pride," complained Stricker, "that it is impossible for us to hold a convention in Portland, but we cannot ask delegates and their wives from the 11 western states to come to Portland with the hotel situation being what it is."

BERLIN, June 1—(AP)—Russia slowed down western motor traffic today in reported retaliation for "mistreatment" of German communist youngsters at Luebeck on their return from a Soviet east Berlin red rally.

Truck drivers stalled by border guards at the Helmsstedt highway checkpoint said the Russians told them the slow-down was a reprisal measure.

Paralytic, 32, Graduates at Canby High

CANBY, June 1—(AP)—A 32-year-old man, paralyzed since a diving accident at the age of 14, was graduated with honors from Canby high school tonight.

George Nelson, who has earned his living as a newspaper correspondent and salesman of cards and magazine subscriptions, earned perfect grades at Canby high since he resumed studying a few years ago.

He attended graduation exercises in his wheel chair and received his diploma, along with the younger students.

Nelson was paralyzed from the neck down when he dived into the Pudding river 18 years ago and struck his head on the bottom. That interrupted his schooling.

Besides the diploma, another treat is awaiting Nelson: A trip to San Francisco. Southern Pacific trainmen, who work near his home, are giving it to him.

U.N. Blocks Chinese Reds

LAKE SUCCESS, June 1—(AP)—The United Nations trusteeship council voted down a new Russian demand today to expel nationalist China. The Russian delegation then staged another walk-out.

Only Russia voted for the ouster; Britain and Argentina abstained; and the other nine council members voted against it.

It was the first test on the question since British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin told the house of commons last week that the labor government feels red China ought to be in the U. N.

Cluck to Plead To Check Charge

Murel Elmer Cluck, 2173 N. Front st., has been ordered to plead today to a charge he cashed two checks, one for \$65 and the other for \$115, in Silverton with insufficient bank funds to back up the checks.

Woman Senator Scolds 'Smear' Tactic in Probe

WASHINGTON, June 1—(AP)—Senator Margaret Chase Smith (R-Me), the senate's only woman member, today delivered a blistering attack in the senate against both republicans and democrats for their tactics in the furor over charges of communism in the government. "The American people are sick and tired," she said, "of seeing innocent people smeared and guilty people whitewashed."

Both sides, she said, are "playing directly into the communist design of 'confuse, divide and conquer'."

Without mentioning Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.), she said the republicans can find enough campaign issues in the record of the "ineffective" Truman administration without resorting to "political smears."

The nation sorely needs a republican victory, she said, "but I don't want to see the republican party ride to political victory on the four horsemen of calumny—fear, ignorance, bigotry and smear."

Noted Lawyer To Defend Harry Gold

PHILADELPHIA, June 1—(AP)—The man who planned and directed Alfred M. Landon's campaign for the presidency 14 years ago was named today to defend Harry Gold, accused of being a courier for Russian atomic espionage.

Appointment of John D. M. Hamilton was announced by U. S. District Judge James P. McGranery, who disclosed yesterday that Gold had told him he will plead guilty to the charge of espionage but will deny any "intent to harm" the United States.

Gold is charged with being the go-between through whom Dr. Klaus Fuchs, convicted British spy, delivered secrets of the U. S. atomic bomb program to a Russian agent, Fuchs, once Britain's

top atomic scientist, now is serving a 14-year term in an English prison.

Gold had asked Judge McGranery to appoint his defense counsel, because he had no money to retain a lawyer.

Hamilton told a reporter he considered it "part of my obligation as a member of the bar" to accept the case.

Rogge Lobbies For Yugoslavia

LONDON, June 1—(AP)—O. John Rogge, a former U.S. government prosecutor who recently was applauded in Kremlin, announced today that he is a registered lobbyist for Yugoslavia, Russia's enemy.

The ex-assistant U.S. attorney general made the statement at a not so peaceful meeting of the executive committee of the Soviet-blessed world peace committee. He is a committee vice president.

Rogge thus confirmed bitter assertions by American Negro singer Paul Robeson that Rogge was a "paid lobbyist" for the anti-Soviet communist regime of Yugoslavia's Premier Marshal Tito.
