

1200-Acre Coast Blaze Tops List of Oregon's Forest Fires

Forest fires raged over Oregon and southwest Washington Friday and Saturday, threatening to break out again today as the weather bureau predicted continued dry weather, low humidity and high winds.

Wind-fanned flames burned near Detroit dam in Oregon (story on page one), forced closure of the Willamette highway, blackened a part of the Klamath Indian reservation, spread over Humboldt mountains on the southern Oregon coast and drove ten families from their farm homes near Vancouver, Wash.

Logging Closed
State Forester George Spaul Friday cautioned all of Oregon of the "extreme fire danger" and noted that nearly all logging operations were shut down due to humidity and wind. Spaul said conditions may spread plans for employment of the full state forest protective force.

Humidity Friday was as low as 9 per cent at Black Rock near Dallas and 11 per cent at Medford, which Spaul called "unprecedented for this time of year."

Fire on Coast Friday was on the Oregon coast near Port Orford, where the Humboldt mountain blaze had spread over 1,200 acres of slashings and timber since Wednesday.

An almost equally large blaze roared through 1,000 acres of the Klamath Indian reservation in Oregon. Crews had it fairly well under control by late afternoon. The area contained no buildings.

A right-of-way fire near Lowell, Ore., jumped into slashings at noon Friday and swept out of control. The Willamette highway was

closed to traffic through the area, because of the fire burning along three miles of the highway.

Lane County Fire
The Little Fall creek blaze, in the same Lane county area, burst loose again after foresters had brought it under control. That fire, which had already consumed more than a square mile of timber and logging slash, ate through about 300 more acres of green and second-growth timber.

A fire, earlier believed under control, burst loose on the Siskiyou national forest 10 miles south of Takilma, Ore., and began spreading toward the six-mile distant Redwood highway. About 100 acres had burned.

A blaze broke out on the Grants Pass city dump and headed toward populated suburbs, but was checked before reaching any homes.

Crews were dispatched from Forest Grove to three fires: in logging operations near Mist in Columbia county; in another logging area near Pike in Yamhill county; and along the Southern Pacific right-of-way near Scottfield in Washington county.

Other blazes blackened 100 acres of virgin timber at Johnson mountain near Powers, damaged the Brookings Lumber company near Brookings, and burned small acreages in a score of areas.

McCarthy Asks Files Opened

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Republican Senator McCarthy accused President Truman in the senate today of defending the "vicious vested interest" of communists in the state department.

The Wisconsin senator again called on the president to open all federal files on the scores of persons he has called pro-communists, and he demanded:

"Why are you hiding the proof, Mr. Truman? The American people would like to have an answer to that question."

Europe Forms 5-Year Plan

PARIS, June 2 (AP)—A five-year plan to succeed America's European recovery program when it expires in 1952 was adopted tonight by foreign ministers of Marshall plan nations.

In another development, well informed sources said that six European countries — but not Britain — are expected to announce tomorrow their willingness to yield control of their coal and steel industries to international authority.

The five-year plan provides that Europe must make available to backward areas "large quantities of capital equipment and consumer goods within the compass of its resources," if Europe is to "maintain its world position."

Veep Given Special Medal By Congress

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Vice President Alben W. Barkley, handed a gold medal today by President Truman for "distinguished public service" said modestly he did not know why congress voted it. The nation's No. 2 officeholder walked into Mr. Truman's oval office for a ceremony easily one of the highlights of his long public career.

He stood beside the president, with justices of the supreme court, members of the cabinet, democratic senators and their wives gathered to do him honor.

Mr. Truman presented him with the medal, for which congress voted \$2,500 last August. It bore a likeness of Barkley on one side, an American Eagle on the other.

In presenting the medal Mr. Truman said he had never had a privilege he appreciated more. Barkley, accepting, said he would try to be brief "despite my long service in the senate."

"I still do not know why congress did it," he said.

Opinion Split As Hop Men Discuss Pact

MT. ANGEL, June 2 — Opinion was divided here tonight at a called meeting of hop growers as to whether the present marketing act agreement might be improved upon or whether in tampering with it, something worse might be the outcome.

At a vote, following three hours discussion, 20 favored circulating petitions asking that hearings be held to determine the possibility of amendments to solve the problems the growers now face under this agreement. Nine of the 55 people present voted against the circulation of petitions, and 26 did not vote either way.

Ed Willig, acting as chairman for the unorganized group, appointed Gordon Aman, Mt. Angel, K. W. Smith, Woodburn; John Gaffke, Silverton; Otto Lucht, Mt. Angel, and Sam Pahl, Donald, as a committee to circulate the petitions asking for the hearing.

The meeting was called at the behest of Yakima growers, represented tonight by five members including William Roy, Ray Charvet, Noel Charvet, Lawrence Brulotte and Kenneth Hawkins. This group reported that 97 per cent of the hop growers in the Yakima area had signed the petitions asking for the hearings, and that upon the favorable vote here, the committee would go into California and Idaho in hopes of having the petitions circulated there.

Problems created and objected to under the agreement, Hawkins, spokesman for the Yakima group, said, were the trading in market certificates, the increased acreage in hops, the steps taken by brewers to cut down the usage of hops because of the high price between the dealer and the brewer, the price above parity on hops, and the fact that quality has no bearing on price in the agreement.

With the present set up and the uses to which the marketing agreement is being put, Oregon growers won't long be in the business, was the expressed opinion of many of those attending the meeting.

Death Claims Mrs. Libby After Illness

Death claimed Mrs. Mary E. Libby, 95-year-old Salem area resident, Friday. She died at the home of her son, Hollis W. Libby, Salem route 9, box 152, following an illness of two months.

Mrs. Libby was born at Prescott, Me., and came to Oregon in 1911 following the death of her husband, John Leander Libby. She lived at Eugene until 1942 and at Woodburn for three years before moving to this area in 1945. She was a member of the Baptist church here.

Surviving besides her son are two daughters, Mrs. Ethel L. Bid-die, Woodburn, and Mrs. Beatrice M. Baker, Oakland, Calif.; a sister, Emma Wentworth, Oak Park, N. Y.; 10 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

Services will be announced later by the W. T. Rigdon chapel.

Washington, Oregon Vie for Man's Estate

ASTORIA, June 2 (AP)—When a man dies with no will and no heirs, his property reverts to the state.

That is the question in the case of Henry Genies, a fisherman who kept half his money in a trunk on the Washington shore, the other half in an Oregon bank here, and died in his fishing boat in the middle of the Columbia river.

Washington claims all the \$25,750.91 estate because Genies' home was there. Oregon claims the share he banked in Astoria.

With no precedent to decide it, not even the attorney-generals of the two states would make a ruling. The matter will probably go to the Oregon or Washington supreme court.

That is, if somebody more close to Genies doesn't claim the money first. The fisherman, who died a year ago, had a brother in Germany, who will get the money if he can be found.

So far, however, neither newspaper ads nor radio announcements in Germany have located the brother.

Acheson Asks Senators for Foreign Arms

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson asked senators today to approve another \$1,222,500,000 installment of foreign arms aid and told them frankly the future outlay may have to be larger.

He appeared before a joint meeting of the senate armed services and foreign relations committees to make a formal presentation of the administration's request for the second section of the military assistance program, for the 1951 fiscal year which starts July 1.

Memorial Day Toll Increased

EUGENE, June 2 (AP)—Another death from Oregon's Memorial day weekend traffic was recorded today.

Gerald F. Sullivan, 23, Junction City, died in a hospital, second victim of a car that rolled off the highway near Cottage Grove. Edward Ishmael, 33, Junction City, was killed in the wreck.

Dunne Reiterates Plan to Campaign

PORTLAND, June 2 (AP)—Joe E. Dunne, veteran republican legislator and pension leader, reiterated today his intention to run for governor as an independent candidate.

He said he wanted to deny a report that ill health might stop him.

"I am in good health and determined to fulfill my pledge to run as an independent candidate against Douglas McKay and Austin Flegel," Dunne said.

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Franses Plead Innocent to Arson Charge

Vernon Redmond Franses and his wife Carrie Esther Franses, both of Idanha, pleaded innocent Friday to first degree arson charges.

Marion County Circuit Judge George Duncan said he would set a trial date Monday. The Franses were secretly indicted by a Marion county grand jury on the charges involving a Detroit dormitory fire February 2. The couple was released Friday on \$2,000 bail each.

TAX OUT RESTORED

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—The house ways and means committee decided today it had been a little hasty in voting to cut the federal tax on night club bills from 20 per cent to 10. Upon reconsideration, it adjusted the proposed new tax to 15 per cent.

Wreck Injures Elderly Man

Edward Dencer, 76, of Salem, route 3 was hospitalized Friday night after his auto collided with a car driven by Delbert LeRoy Johnson, 17, Salem route 5, at the intersection of Salem Heights and Liberty roads south of the city limits.

The city first aid squad took Dencer to Memorial hospital where attendants said he apparently was in "good" condition early this morning. He incurred bruises and shock. State police said Johnson incurred only a minor bump on his head. The accident occurred shortly before 11 p.m. and both cars were damaged slightly.

J. H. Baker, Ex-Drygoods Merchant, Dies

Joseph Houston Baker, a Salem resident since 1890 who was associated with the drygoods business here for many years, died Friday night at a local hospital. He was 81.

Baker, born April 17, 1869 in Pennsylvania, came to Salem with his parents in 1890. He was married June 23 1897, to May Elizabeth Barnes and joined her brother, E. T. Barnes, in the drygoods business until they both retired in 1920.

The deceased later was floor manager of Shipley's store in Salem and managed his own apartment house on Court street until ill health forced him to enter Salem General hospital last December.

Baker, a member of the First Methodist church of Salem, is survived by two brothers, a sister and numerous nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at 1 p.m. Monday from the W. T. Rigdon chapel with the Rev. Brooks H. Moore officiating. Concluding services will be in City View cemetery.
