The Chickens Help

Eggs in Summertime Find Best Place In Luncheon Salads, Buffet Plates

Perhaps, because we are in the chicken business in a very small sort of way, we are egg conscious. But even away back in the days when we knew nothing of the joys of responsibility for the feeding of from 25 to 100 avian mouths, whether or no, we thought eggs were awfully good to eat.

Summertime egg-eating consists mostly of deviled eggs in any number of variations, and salads in which eggs provide the protein. Then there's occasionally a luncheon dish or souffle thrown in for interest.

Eggs and cheese can make a lovely summertime salad.

EGG AND CHEESE SALAD BOWL
Head of lettuce 1 carrot cut in sticks
Assorted greens 1 sliced cucumber
4 hard cooked eggs 1/4 pound cheese in shivers
French dressing

Find variation of greens by using watercress, chicory, young spinach leaves or others when in season. Cut the cheese in finger-sized pieces, toss with the greens, egg wedges and cucumber slices. Mix lightly with the French dressing.

Beets, cooked and marinated in spiced vinegar, may be cut up and combined with chopped hard cooked egg and mayonnaise. Tomatoes may be stuffed with chopped hard cooked eggs combined with celery and pickles. Or other regular stuffing such as tuna or chicken is good when put into the tomato and iced yolk egg used to garnish.

A fine relish plate may be arranged for a buffet meal, using celery and eggs. Use either the plain hard cooked eggs, or deviled eggs, and place on a plate with celery hearts which have been split lengthwise. Put any favorite dip alongside (mayonnaise with horseradish, thousand island or other highly seasoned combination).

EGG SALAD MOLD
2 teaspoons plain gelatin 2 tablespoons diced green pepper
1/4 cup cold water 2 tablespoons pickle relish
1 cup mayonnaise 1 tablespoon diced pimiento
4 hard cooked eggs 1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup diced celery 1/4 teaspoon salt

Soften gelatin in cold water for about five minutes, dissolved over hot water. Cool, and when thickened add remaining ingredients. Mold individually or in one large mold. Place center sliced of the eggs in the outside of mold, so they will show when concealed.

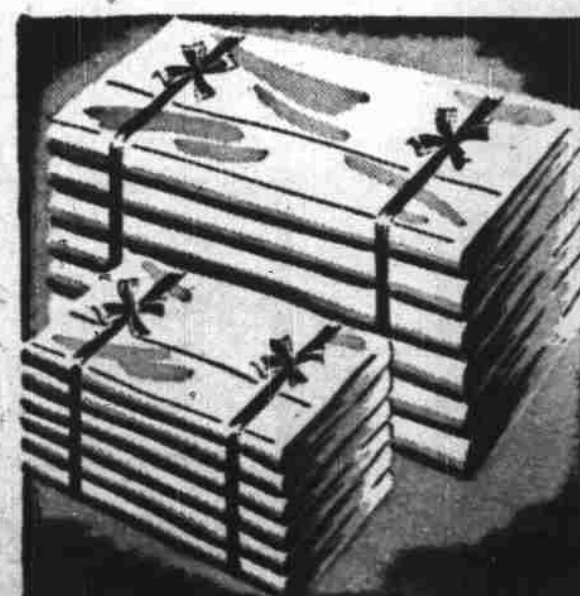

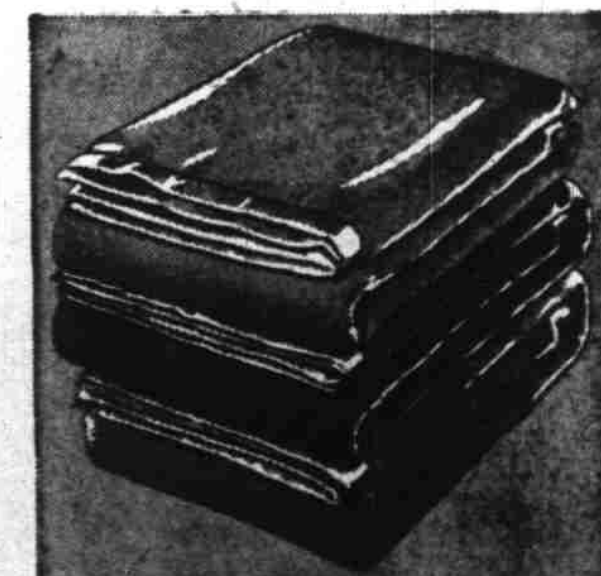
