NEWTON, Ia., June 3—(AP)—A 21-year-old employe fell into a 3,000-gallon tank containing sulphuric acid at the plant of the Maytag Washing Machine company here today.

The employe, Melvin Dainty, managed to keep his head above the surface until a fellow worker fished him out. He was reported recovering from severe burns. The tank was located in the painting department and contained a six per cent solution of acid.

Dainty fell into the vat when a catwalk gave way, company officials said.
