Vet Committee Asks McCarthy Impeached

WASHINGTON, June 4 —(AP)—Impeachment of Senator Joseph R. McCarthy as "unfit for office" and guilty of "moral turpitude" was demanded today by the American Veteran committee's national planning committee.

McCarthy declined to comment on the demand, except to say: "I am too busy with more important things to do, such as cleaning the communists out of the state department."

The group drew up an 800-word denunciation against the Wisconsin republican who stirred up a controversy in congress and elsewhere with his charges that communists infest the state department.

Asks Introduction

The committee instructed AVC National Commander Michael Straight to seek immediate introduction of the proposed articles of impeachment in the house.

The group asserted that McCarthy was guilty of degrading the senate and of doing "more than any other un-American force to bring world scorn, domestic obloquy and general disgrace upon the senate."

The proposed bill of impeachment also declared:

"He accepted, without a word of protest, much less any public disclaimer, the support of the communist party of Wisconsin—which means that of the communist party of the United States, which undoubtedly cleared such action with the kremlin—in his candidacy for senator."

Repudiated Such Support

The group said that "high-minded candidates for office . . . vigorously and publicly repudiated such tainted support."

AVC, founded in 1944, claims about 40,000 members—all veterans of the second World War. About two years ago it amended its constitution to purge itself of communists.

Its national planning committee is a sort of executive board. It has 25 members, 22 of whom attended a quarterly meeting here this weekend. The group in a statement that all 22 approved the decision to work for impeachment of McCarthy.

One of the counts in the proposed articles of impeachment asserted that McCarthy violated state law and the ethics of the legal profession by retaining his circuit court judgeship while he campaigned for the senate.

Still another said the senator "paralyzed the state department . . . by means of a series of lies" to the effect, at various times, that there were 205 or 57 communists in the department. It said the senator has since repeated that the department harbors varying numbers of party members "without as yet proving these drastic charges against any individual."

ASK LOYALTY INQUIRY

WASHINGTON, June 4 —(AP)—Administration officials reported tonight that President Truman is being urged by some advisers to create a commission of eminent citizens to study the government's loyalty and security set-up.

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
