Credit Firm to Erect Building

Construction of a new \$23,000 Willamette Production Credit association office building at 715 N. Commercial st. was authorized Monday by the city engineer's office.

The building, a reinforced concrete structure, 40 by 65 feet, will be constructed by Browning and Randolph. W. F. Severin is the architect. The structure also will house the Federal Land bank which now has joint offices with the credit association at 299 N. Commercial st.

Handbills Call Attention to School Election

Bulletins urging parents to vote for a school building program will be handed to all Salem school district students today when they call for their report cards.

The bulletins are being distributed by a citizens committee and parents' organizations of elementary schools. They call attention to a proposal which will be on the ballot at the June 19 school election.

The proposal is a \$1,000,000 bond issue and a six-mill serial tax levy. The money would be used to relieve crowding in elementary schools.

The bulletins are being distributed at a rate has tripled in the past 15 years and is at an all-time high. It calls this the chief reason more classrooms are needed. The fact that many new families have moved to Salem also is mentioned.

Organizations supporting the campaign for the building program include the parents clubs or parent-teacher associations from the following school districts: Salem Heights, Lincoln, McKinley, West Salem, Highland, Swegle, Auburn, Englewood, Garfield, Richmond, Bush, Pringle and Liberty.

Officials Open Sewage Plant Equipment Bid

Low bids for providing four items of sewage treatment plant equipment for the city of Salem were entered by Walker Process Equipment company Monday at the city engineer's office.

The bids included: Mechanically cleaned bar screens, \$3,350 basic and \$3,275 alternate; grit collection equipment, \$2,977 basic and \$3,650 alternate; sludge collector units, \$7,405; and mechanical skimmers, \$1,492.

Other bids were entered by American Wells Works, H. D. Fowler company, Jeffery Manufacturing company and Link Belt company. Contracts for the equipment, which will be used in connection with the city's new interceptor sewer, will be awarded after study by the city engineer's office.

Increase in Gasoline Sales

April gasoline sales in Oregon totaled 41,407,652 gallons, a 10 per cent increase over sales in the preceding month, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry has announced.

April sales a year ago aggregated 40,852,055 gallons. Gross taxes for the month were \$2,484,584, a jump of approximately \$442,000 over collections for the same month last year. Most of the gain is the result of the one cent per gallon tax increase which became operative last July 1, Newbry said.

Gov. McKay to Inspect Project

Gov. Douglas McKay will leave Salem this morning for Warner valley, where with other members of the state land board and members of the state game commission he will inspect the Warner valley reclamation project in Lake county.

From there he will go by plane to San Francisco to attend a meeting of the Pacific coast board of intergovernmental relations.

Tax Studiers Ask Emphasis on Education Over School Plants

Accusation of too much emphasis on public school plants and too little on quality of education was directed Monday at the state board of education by the 1949 legislative interim committee on taxation. The statement came at a meeting in Salem following numerous hearings around the state by the committee.

Car Accident Toll Tallied

Oregon automobile accidents claimed 5.1 lives for each 100,000 miles of driving in the first four months of this year, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry has reported. That compares with 6.3 for the entire year of 1949.

Although total deaths were higher than those reported in the first four months of last year, motor vehicle travel increased even more to bring about a reduction in the mileage death rate. April travel was estimated at approximately 492,000,000 miles, highest yet recorded during that month. Twenty-one persons died in traffic accidents.

Remington Given Dismissal Notice

WASHINGTON, June 5 — (AP) The commerce department today notified William W. Remington it plans to drop him from its payroll in 30 days.

It gave the \$10,000-a-year economist just five days to answer complaints set out in the notice. The department did not disclose the precise complaints. But officials said the general line was that it was "administratively unfeasible and impracticable" to keep him in the department.

Mrs. Meeker Succumbs at Portland Home

Mrs. Lilah L. Meeker, a former Salem resident, died Monday at her residence in Portland. She had lived here for 20 years before moving to Portland in 1947.

Surviving are the widower, Walter L. Meeker, Portland; a daughter, Mrs. R. G. Koerner, Seattle, Wash.; and a sister, Mrs. L. S. Hunter, Oakland, Calif.

Services will be Thursday at 2:30 p.m. at the Colonial mortuary, Portland. Friends are requested to omit flowers. Contributions will be used for a memorial at First Baptist church in Portland where she was a member.

Board Reports Hospital Fund

A balance of \$73,411 formed the so-called hospital indigent fund as of April 1, 1950, the state industrial accident commission reported Monday.

This fund, created by the 1941 legislature, is derived on the basis of 25 cents from each motor vehicle driver's license issued by the secretary of state and is used for payment of hospital nurses, ambulances, and doctors in cases of indigent persons injured on the highways by motor vehicles.

Officials said operation of the act had proved successful.

Oregon Tourist Season Said off To Good Start

If state capitol visitors are indicative, Oregon has the start on a tourist travel season that bids fair to equal or surpass last year's, despite the backward spring. That's the prediction of Mary Louise Lee, temporarily in charge of the capitol guide service, after last week's business.

Next to California and Washington most tourists the past week came from Florida, Texas and other southern and far eastern states, Miss Lee said. Miss Lee said she was surprised at the knowledge expressed by these tourists in connection with Oregon recreational centers.

A large percentage of the tourists are conversant with the location of Crater Lake, Oregon Caves and coast resorts, while a few said they had received literature dealing with Wallowa Lake park and other central and eastern Oregon recreational areas.

Virtually all tourists carried maps, Miss Lee averred, along with printed information received from the State Highway commission travel bureau in Salem. Interrogation of the advance guard of summer tourists indicated that many of them are well-to-do retired farmers who have sold their farms and are enjoying their first trip to the Pacific coast.

"In advising tourists we want to be fair with all parts of the state," Miss Lee said, "and consequently our information is impartial." Condition of highways is sought by many eastern tourists who are unaccustomed to driving in mountainous districts.

Several tourists here the past few days admitted they were "looking the country over" with a view of locating somewhere in Oregon, California or Washington. All were surprised at the tourist accommodations found on the Pacific coast with particular relation to hotels and motels. Rates, most of them said, compare favorably with those in the east where tourist homes predominate.

Open Daily, Sunday

Guide service in the state capitol was established several years ago with the result that many thousands of tourists inspect the building each summer. The capitol building is open to visitors daily, including Sundays, during the summer months.

Miss Lee, a student at Willamette university, says she loves her temporary work. James McGilchrist, regular guide, is ill with pneumonia.

"While I apparently do not have

the background for history mastered by McGilchrist I have been treated royally by the tourists and have been able to answer most of their questions," Miss Lee said. From Miss Lee's information most of the tourists traveling here by automobile came over the southern route and will return over the northern highway arteries. Canada also is attracting a large number of tourists who arrive at the capitol, according to Miss Lee.

Butler Named Professor of Music at WU

Appointment of Stanley Butler as assistant professor of music at Willamette university has been announced by President G. Herbert Smith.

Butler, who has been on the staff at Western Reserve university in Cleveland, Ohio, since 1942, will replace Bennett Ludden, who resigned to study in New York. Smith also named Clarence A. Kraft as instructor in Spanish. Kraft is now teaching at University of Oregon and has studied at the University of Chile, Santiago, Chile. This is an addition to the faculty.

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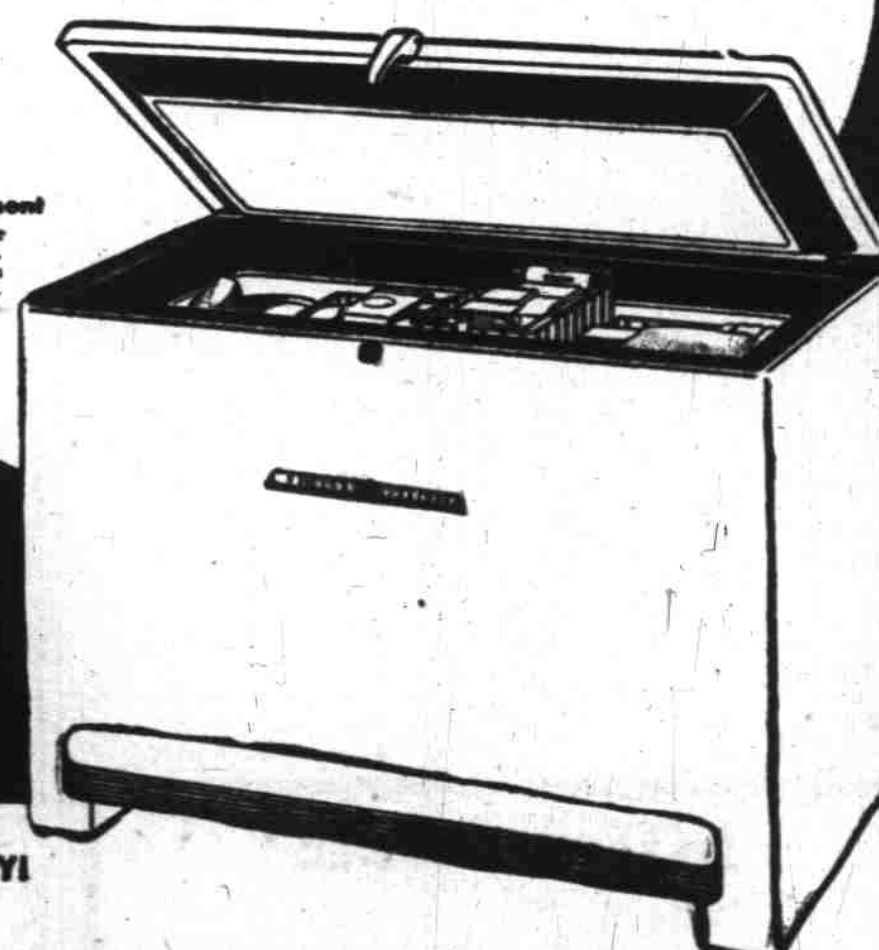
