Hollywood, Padres In Battle for Lead

The Portland Beavers, clinging to fourth place in the Coast league baseball race, take on the Los Angeles Angels in their next home stand at Vaughn street park in Portland, starting with a single game tonight. The Beavers won the series from San Francisco last week, 4-3, and the week before copped a 4-3 series nod at Los Angeles.

Other PCL series starting tonight find San Diego at Hollywood, San Francisco at Seattle and Sacramento at Oakland. The Padres and Stars are currently tied for the league lead, so anticipate a tangle series in the film city.

Oakland is three games off the pace in third place and Portland is five games out of first place. The San Franciscans, in fifth place, are two games behind Portland and half a game ahead of Los Angeles. Seattle continues its steady climb and is now only 10½ games out of first place and 5½ behind Portland.

Hot Rod Races Next at Bowl

The roaring roadsters—or "hot rods"—return to Hollywood bowl for the next racing program Saturday night of this week, announces Valley Sports Promoter Charles Heitz. The "rods" presented the first two speed programs of the Salem season, and then stood by while the midwinters had two meetings here the last pair of Saturday nights.

Heitz expects to have a full field of cars and drivers for the roadster program. Time trials will start at eight o'clock, and trophy dash, heat races and Class B and A main events will follow.

Salem's Max Humm, in Don Waters' car won the 1950 inaugural at the bowl and then in the No. 2 program it was Randy Francis who drove home the winner.

Many of the car owners have had plenty of time the past couple of weeks to work their equipment into top running shape. A fast program is therefore likely Saturday.

Salem Golfers In Even Swap

Twenty-man teams for the Salem Golf course Sunday broke even in a home-and-home match with Corvallis. The Salem "A" team, playing in Corvallis, lost to the "A" team there by a 36½ to 20½ score. The local "B" team downed Corvallis seconds, 40½ to 25½ here, however. For the "A" men Roger Williams of Corvallis was medalist with a 73. High for Salem were Floyd Baxter and Lawrence Alley, each with 77.

A return match is booked for Sunday, June 18, with the teams switching sites.

Gregory Says Balk Rule Off

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5 (AP)—The sporting editor of the Oregonian said today that Coast league umpires no longer are enforcing the controversial one-second balk rule. L. H. Gregory wrote in his daily newspaper column that it was obvious the league had given up on the rule, which required pitchers, when runners are on base, to pause one second between stretch and delivery to the plate.

A quick reply comes from Seattle, however, after the Rainiers had scored a run on Los Angeles Sunday when an umpire called a balk which observers said patently was a one-second count. Los Angeles Manager Bill Kelly protested vigorously. The Seattle writer chided Gregory with, "Mebbe word hasn't filtered to umps this far north, eh?"

No official announcement has come from league headquarters in Los Angeles concerning a change in the balk rule.

50,000 to Watch It Savold, Woodcock Battle For Heavy 'Title' Tonight

LONDON, June 5 (AP)—Lee Savold climaxes 11 years as a heavyweight contender tomorrow night with his first shot at the title. It's really only half a title—the British and European variety. But if he wins, the one-time cowboy turned the same position as the man who has a bird in his hand instead of in the bushes.

Opposing Savold will be Bruce Woodcock, the British knockout artist who has won 31 of his 37 professional fights. He's the British Empire champ and held the European heavyweight title until he let it lapse through inactivity.

The two men are scheduled to do battle over 15 rounds at White City stadium starting about 3 p.m. (EST). A warm, muggy night has been forecast with possible thunderstorms. Promoter Jack Solomons says the show will go on regardless of the weather. He's never had rain for an outdoor production.

The 50,000 seats, worth \$224,000, have been sold for two months. Scalpers were doing a brisk business at up to double face value for the tickets. A ring side sold originally for \$29.40.

Savold, whose next birthday will make him 35, has been around boxing rings for 17 years. As long ago as 1939 he was classed as an official contender. Then he lost to Buddy Baer. Another long winning streak was snapped by Billy Conn in late 1940 and still another campaign toward a title fight was ended by losses to Tony Musto, Tami Mauriello and Jimmy Blivins in 1942.

The Englewood, N.J. veteran did not take any chances on a surprise beating along the way this time. He stayed idle for 18 months waiting for this bout.

Although the United States has not recognized this as a title bout, Solomons said: "I feel that I have just as much right as anyone to stage a world championship fight. I have two of the best heavyweights anywhere and I am willing to match the winner against anyone."

Horses Wearing 'Falsies' Also

BALTIMORE, June 5 (AP)—Major race horses are wearing falsies, too.

They're better than tennis balls, give more bounce. The rubber sponge cups are taped on back of the foreleg fetlocks, the first protruding joints above the hooves, where some thoroughbreds bear down in galloping. The cups protect the horses from cuts and bruises on the heel.

Trainers used to cut tennis balls in half to fit them on such horses. But falsies give better protection, explained Trainer C. W. Shaw, Jr., of Fallston, Md. Don't make the horses look any better, though, he added.

Video Problem On PCC Slate

LOS ANGELES, June 5 (Special)—Television is the major issue of public interest appearing on the agenda for the spring meeting of the Pacific Coast conference June 11 to 14 in Victoria, B. C. The PCC faculty athletic representatives and athletic directors are expected to give a major portion of their time to a determination of a conference-wide policy on the television of athletic contests, particularly football.

Commenting on the television problem, Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt said, "The conference schools would like to televise all games as a service to the public. However, while other elements influence television policy, the principal question is what we can afford to do. Conference athletics do not live on appropriations or endowment income. They support themselves."

"The only sport regularly making its own way is football. Track, baseball, crew, swimming, tennis, golf, fencing, etc. and even basketball in most cases, must live off football in some schools drama, debating and other student activities also do."

Another important item of business at the meeting will be the annual report of the commissioner concerning compliance with the member institutions. A report of the Rose Bowl committee also will be heard. In connection with this subject there will also be a report of the conference interim committee which was appointed last December to discuss with representatives of the Big Ten and of the Tournament of Roses the possibility of future arrangements respecting the Rose Bowl game.

Also on the agenda is a discussion of the following items: Discussion of programs involving employment opportunities for athletes on the campuses. The possible amendment of the entertainment rule which would permit transportation of prospective students to campuses by alumni.
