Ernest Rostel, Travel Bureau Writer, Dies

Ernest A. Rostel, long-time newspaperman and recently a special writer and photographer with the travel bureau of the state highway department, died in Salem Tuesday at the age of 43.

Rostel, who had been ill for several weeks, died in a hospital just before noon. He is survived by the widow, the former Margaret Hensley of Stayton to whom he was married in 1935. They resided at 240 Strand ave.

The deceased was born Jan. 31, 1907, at Central Point, the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Rostel, pioneers of Jacksonville. He was affiliated with the Mail-Tribune newspaper at Medford and then entered the national park service for 13 years. During the war years he was publisher of the Hartford county Gazette at Bel Air, Maryland.

Later Rostel was city editor of the Morning Tribune at Lewiston, Idaho, and four years ago he joined the travel bureau here. His last assignment was the preparation of a pamphlet for the pioneer museum at Jacksonville.

He is also survived by a brother, Bert Rostel of Central Point. Funeral services are being arranged by the W. T. Rigdon chapel.

Filing Scope Challenged by State Justices

The scope of filings of expense accounts in connection with the recent primary election was the subject of varying opinions by officials in Salem Tuesday.

Justices Hall S. Lusk and Earl Latourette, in a curbside opinion, said it was not necessary for candidates to include their filing fees in their expense accounts filed with the state elections bureau. David O'Hara, in charge of the elections bureau, held it is necessary for candidates to include their filing fees but that such fees are not charged against the total amount they can expend under the state law.

Math Instructor Appointed at WU

Robert Finley Reid, faculty member at Southern Methodist university, has been appointed instructor of mathematics at Willamette university, President G. Herbert Smith announced Tuesday.

Another addition to the Willamette staff next fall will be Ainsley Abbot Whitman, professor at the University of Georgia, who will take over as librarian. He was formerly head librarian at California State polytechnic. He replaces Thomas Gillies, who resigned to do graduate work at Kansas.

Jobless List Cut Sharply; Below 1949

More than two-thirds of the record number of the unemployed during last winter's cold spell have found jobs, which dropped Oregon unemployment last week to 30,434, lowest June 8 figure since the end of the war, the state unemployment compensation commission announced Tuesday.

A year ago 39,600 persons were actively seeking work, local employment offices reported, while a month ago 40,852 were without jobs. During each of the two past winters seasonal shutdowns raised unemployment over the 90,000 mark, while last mid-February the top figure of 97,000 was recorded.

Lumber and logging, construction, food processing and agriculture were given main credit for the 10,500 additional jobs last month and the 55,000 during the previous three months in the spring recovery.

Further gains were expected during June as delayed harvest and canning operations get under way.

Nearly 85,000 now are employed in lumber and logging, the commission estimated, as compared with the post-war low of 55,000 last winter and a top of 91,000 in August, 1948.

The metropolitan area, however, reported the largest drop in unemployment last month. In Columbia, Washington and Multnomah counties only 14,950 were seeking jobs as against 18,400 a month ago and 21,000 a year ago. Largest declines during May came from Baker, Pendleton, LaGrande, Roseburg and Corvallis.
