Famous Twosomes

Strawberries Combine with Number of Fruits to Make Marmalade or Jam

The golf course isn't the only place for twosomes nor the tennis court for doubles, the kitchen probably sports more well known teams than any other place. Of course there are such famous couples as ham and eggs, liver and bacon, steak and onions and peaches and cream. But there are lots of other twosomes which, while they've enjoyed less publicity, enhance each other just as much.

Right about this time of year, you'll find certain combinations are especially welcome. Canning and preserving brings out some good combinations.

Gooseberry and strawberry jam is good now, rhubarb and strawberries combine, too. Later we'll make apricot and pineapple marmalade.

RHUBARB-STRAWBERRY JAM
2 cups strawberries 4 1/2 cups sugar
Combine ingredients and bring slowly to a boil so juices be extracted. Cook in shallow pan until done.

RHUBARB-PINEAPPLE CONSERVE
5 cups rhubarb 2 cups crushed pineapple 1 orange, shredded
Cook orange peel with a little water until tender, add to diced rhubarb, sugar and pineapple, which has been drained. Cook in shallow pan until thick.

Strawberries and gooseberries are an excellent flavor combination in **STRAWBERRY-GOOSEBERRY JAM**
1 pound strawberries 2 pounds sugar
1 1/2 pounds gooseberries
Slice strawberries, cover with sugar and let stand for an hour, add gooseberries and cook until mixture jells when put on a cold saucer.

Then too, strawberries, combined with orange, makes a good jam. The citrus fruit aids in thickening the berries.

STRAWBERRY-ORANGE JAM
5 cups berries 4 cups sugar
1 medium orange
Cover berries with sugar and let stand an hour or so. Slice orange thin, cover with water and boil until tender, about half an hour. Add to berries which have been brought to a boil. Cook, stirring constantly until thick and jellylike. Makes 8 glasses.
