**Bull Market** Jumps Sharply

NEW YORK, June 8-(P)-The 1949-50 bull stock market lunged into greener pastures today.

Top-quality stocks sold at the highest prices in one to 21 years in a broad display of strength.
Individual gains ranged to around
3 points, although most were a
point or less.

Today's performance was a tri-umphant recovery from the in-tense selling that laid the market low earlier this week. The overall rise was the largest in around three months although equalled since then.

Sales totaled 1,780,000 shares, against 1,740,000 Wednesday.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks swung up .7 of one point to 79.5, highest point reached since June, 1946, and within shooting distance of a peak since 1931.


