Great Outdoors

Summertime Dining Under the Sky Is Cause for Changing Way of Cooking

It happens every summer in our valley. People cease being indoor diners, and take to the open places, whether they be patios, back yards or real woodlands. Habits of eating change with the dining spots.

Patio meals are the most civilized, back yard eating goes a bit more rugged, and of course picnics in the woods demand special foods which may be taken out already prepared, or cooked at the place of the picnic.

There are two schools of thought on picnic meals. One school advocates the cooking of meals at the picnic grounds, the other says "sandwiches and potato salad, with coffee in a thermos." Pink lemonade, standby of a generation or two ago, has entirely given "way to carbonated beverages.

Those who cook their food at the picnic grounds find that steaks, hamburgers or hot dogs are considered standard fare. The steaks are boiled on sticks, the hamburgers cooked in a skillet and the hot dogs are thrust on a stick by the patient ones, and given a thorough hearty tan over the open fire, or eaten cold on a bun by those who can't wait for the fire to get hot.

What goes around the meat is a matter of family taste. It may be finger rolls, hamburger buns, toast made on a stick, or just plain bread.

If the main dish is to be brought ready-made, chances are it won't be the chicken of a few decades ago, it will be a casserole dish, wrapped in newspapers to keep hot.

We're of the rugged type, our favorite way of open-fire cooking being with aluminum mess kits we get from an army surplus store. Each diner takes care of his own cooking, each one is therefore delightfully satisfied.

Favorite of favorites, besides eggs in one form or another, is the banana-pork sausage combination. We place the portion of sausages in our mess kit, and partially cook them, then add a banana, cover the kit and cook slowly until banana clears and meat is done.

Fried potatoes and onions may be cooked in a mess kit, pulled to one side and eggs scrambled in the same pan.

As to salads, potato salad still remains the most popular outdoor kind. Macaroni or fruit salad come in a close second. Mixed vegetable salad can be tossed at home, but the dressing must be put on the last minute or lettuce withers.

Old fashioned cole slaw is a good salad for picnics. And here's a dressing for it:

SOUP CREAM DRESSING
1 cup thick soup cream 1½ to 2 teaspoons prepared mustard
2 teaspoons sugar Paprika
1 teaspoon salt
Beat cream until stiff and smooth, add seasonings, mix well. As a variation add ¼ cup peanut butter, 3 tablespoons vinegar, and omit the mustard.
