

Japan Police Crack Down On Communists

TOKYO, June 10 (AP)—Police today cracked down on communists at Yokosuka, site of the big U. S. naval base south of Tokyo.

The action was geared to police drives against communist anti-occupation activities in Tokyo and Osaka.

Public meetings in Yokosuka's city square were banned. Police ordered communists to rip down copies of the party newspaper Akahata (Red Flag) from billboards.

Government leaders conferred with police officials in Tokyo. It was reported they talked about plans to squelch any demonstrations against General MacArthur's purge of the communist party's high command.

The Chinese communist radio again attacked MacArthur for his purge. It quoted the Peiping Kwang Ming daily as saying "it is very clear to the Japanese people that American occupation policy is aimed at turning them into slaves and cannon fodder."

The broadcast was recorded by the Associated Press at San Francisco. (Peiping earlier called his purge of the 24 members of the communist party's central committee and 17 editors of Akahata "as absurd as it is reactionary." It called for "counterblows" from the people.)

Wire Service Said Utilized By Gamblers

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—A senate committee reported today that the Continental Press service of Cleveland enjoys a "near monopoly" on the distribution of race news used by bookmakers over the country.

The senate was told that some California bookies, cut off from direct wire loops, get Continental's information by a relay from a broadcasting station in Mexico.

The commerce committee is urging adoption of a bill to outlaw the sending of much pre-race information across state lines. It said Continental is the major source of data for the illegal betting — an industry rated at \$3,000,000,000 to \$5,000,000,000 a year.

Wire and telephone communications companies, press services and daily newspapers also are useful to the bookies, the committee said. But it emphasized that the gathering, transmission and publication of racing news is entirely legal.

Husband of Globe-Girdler Asks Divorce

CAMBRIDGE, Eng., June 10 (AP)—Red-haired Mrs. Richarda Morrow-Tait was accused by her husband today of misconduct with a Cambridge university scholar who helped her fly around the world in a year and a day.

Suing for divorce, husband Norman R. Morrow-Tait named Michael Townsend, 26, as co-respondent.

Mrs. Morrow-Tait, also 26 and a former artist's model, set off on her round-the-world trip in a single engine Proctor airplane in August, 1948. She had hoped to make the journey in six weeks. Townsend went along as navigator.

After a series of accidents they got as far as Alaska, where the plane was wrecked in a forced landing in November, 1948. Townsend gave up and went back to Cambridge to resume his studies.

Mrs. Morrow-Tait worked as various jobs in Canada, and the United States and with the help of generous Americans finally bought another plane. At this point Townsend rejoined her for the hop across the Atlantic.

She landed at Croydon airport, completing her 366-day flight, in August, 1949.

There to meet her was her husband, a consulting engineer, who had cared for their little girl all during her absence.

Other festivities included the alumni banquet at Baxter hall with Dr. Robert D. Gregg, dean of the liberal arts college speaking, a faculty reception for seniors, and a gathering of law alumni with William Lloyd Prosser, dean of the University of California school of jurisprudence speaking.

\$116,000 Gifts To Willamette

Receipt of gifts totaling \$116,000 in value was reported by President G. Herbert Smith of Willamette university to the board of trustees at its annual meeting held in Collins hall Saturday.

Most of the amount goes for the erection of McCulloch stadium on the athletic field at Bush's pasture.

President Smith reported that the past year had been "most satisfactory" for the university from all angles. Enrollment shows some decline from recent years, and according to the president, real competition for students has returned both among private and public institutions.

Priests Shifted At Mt. Angel

MT. ANGEL — Latest appointments at Mt. Angel were made public Friday by Abbott Thomas Meier, OSB, and include the naming of the Rev. Luke Eberle, OSB, as novice master and the Rev. Boniface Alcher, OSB, to the New Westminster priory.

Father Luke was formerly director of the seminary at New Westminster priory, a branch monastery established in British Columbia, Canada, in 1939 by the Mt. Angel Benedictines.

The 14 monks remaining there in charge of the seminary and priory will according to Canadian laws become Canadian citizens. Father Luke chose not to relinquish his American citizenship and is returning to the home monastery in July to take over his new assignment.

Father Boniface left this week to join a Canadian group. Both Father Luke and Boniface are former Mt. Angel boys. Luke was editor of the St. Joseph magazine, published at Mt. Angel, before his appointment to the Canadian post held for the past several years. Fr. Boniface taught in the seminary and was assistant brother master.

Father Anslem, the new assistant novice master, has been a member of the Mt. Angel Prep faculty for the past three years.

Postal Clerks Oppose New Cuts in Service

Oregon postal clerks Saturday denounced recent postal-service cuts as "a step backward toward the days of the pony express."

That was part of a resolution passed here by the Oregon State Federation of Postoffice Clerks and auxiliary at its 47th annual convention.

The resolution carried unanimously. It also criticized an October, 1949, order of the postmaster general which transferred duties of clerks to mail handlers. The latter are lower-paid employees.

"(It) is an unfair labor practice which could not be tolerated by any labor union..." the resolution stated.

The resolution said the postmaster general's April 18 directive for curtailment of postal services, when fully performed, "will virtually wreck what was once called 'the greatest service organization on earth'."

"The implied economies... are greatly outweighed by the hardship caused to the employees dismissed from the service," it continued.

Copies of the declaration will be sent to the president, to Oregon's senators and congressmen, and to the president of the American Federation of Labor.

More than 100 members attended the convention. Saturday night events were a banquet at the Marion hotel and a dance at the Salem labor temple.

The meet ends today. Officers will be elected at a 9 a.m. session.

Fire Damages Interior of Car

The interior of a 1941 Buick was heavily damaged by fire about 3:30 a.m. Saturday, city firemen reported. The car, parked in the 400 block of S. 18th st., was registered to H. Robert Conklin, Salem route 4.

Firemen said the interior of the car was completely gutted and that windows were broken by the heat. They said the fire probably started from a cigarette.

3 Injured in 99-E Wreck South of Salem

Three persons were injured, one of them seriously, late Saturday night in a head-on collision of two cars about 10 miles south of Salem on the Pacific highway.

In Albany hospital was Mrs. Hazel Ellinboe, 39, 837 W. 7th st., Albany, with severe facial cuts and possible internal injuries. Bruised but not hospitalized were her husband, S. K. Ellinboe, driver of one of the cars. Norman L. Curry, Klamath, Calif., listed as driver of the second car, suffered minor cuts.

Ellinboe said he was driving south about 11:15 p.m. when the accident occurred. Curry was operating a northbound Ford coupe.

Curry was arrested by state police on a charge of driving while intoxicated. He was being held in the Marion county jail early today.

Oregon's Gold Production Up

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—Oregon turned out 16,226 fine ounces of gold last year, compared to 14,611 ounces the year before, the bureau of mines reported Friday.

Silver production in the state declined from 13,598 to 12,195 ounces. Copper output increased tremendously, from 4,000 pounds to 40,000.

The state earned \$592,107 from gold, silver, copper, lead, and zinc during the year.

50-Year-Old Cake Eaten at Wedding Anniversary Party

WARREN, Me., June 10 (AP)—A cake baked 50 years ago was eaten today by Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Dillaway and their golden wedding anniversary guests.

"It was delicious," the Dillaways said. The cake was one of two identical six-pound fruit cakes baked in east Boston by Mrs. Lydia J. Dillaway for her son's wedding at a Congregational church in Everett, Mass., in 1900.

It was sealed in an air-tight can. The bridegroom's mother told him to open it on his 50th wedding anniversary.

Dillaway, 73, was asked if he ever had an urge to sample it. "Well, I'll have to admit I opened the can about ten years ago," he replied, "but that was just to make sure it was coming along O. K."

300 Pickers Needed to Fill Quota Monday

An additional 300 strawberry pickers will be needed when growers load up at the Salem office of the state employment service here Monday morning.

Manager William Baillie said that five more growers had sought workers at the office Saturday morning. By Monday he expects at least double that amount.

Trucks load workers at the office, Ferry and South Cottage streets, from 6:30 to 7:30 a.m. Last week the loadings averaged about 250 persons per day.

Picking wages are 4 1/2 cents per box. Nearly all yards harvesting now are on the valley floor and expect to reach their peak later this week. Picking is expected to get underway in the Silverton hills about June 15 or 19.

Roof of Keizer Home Burns

KEIZER, June 10 (Special)—Fire burned off a portion of the roof at the Conrad Frigaard residence on North River road near the Keizer school about 5 p.m. tonight.

The blaze, apparently starting from wiring, was checked by the Keizer fire department. Firemen said about one quarter of the roof was destroyed and that considerable water damage was caused in two rooms of the house.

The Keizer department also put out a blaze about 6 p.m. at a two-room house on Claxier road. The building was gutted, firemen said. The owner was out of the city and had not been contacted.

Senate Takes Breather in Rent Bill Fight

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—A threat of another filibuster faced weary senate democratic leaders today, but they claimed enough votes to pass an extension of federal rent controls.

A hectic session of nearly 17 hours ended at 2:43 a.m. EST today after Senator Cain (R-Wash.) foe of controls, won his demand

that the first test vote be on a motion to send the rent control extension back to committee. That test will come at 12 noon Monday.

Majority Leader Lucas (D-Ill.) told a reporter he is confident "we have more than enough votes to defeat the effort to send the bill back to committee."

He added that he finally agreed to the test on recommitment "because I hope the senate will be able to consider all motions and amendments and pass the bill before the day is over."

Apparently in good form after his marathon performance, Cain confided that he was ready "to take off again, if necessary, after the vote Monday."

"I think we have a fair chance of winning this thing Monday," he said. "But I have just started this fight if it is not recommitment."
