

'Rose' Tieup Confab Slated

Big Ten's, PCC's To Discuss Renewal

CHICAGO, June 12—(AP)—Renewal of the Rose Bowl pact between the Big Ten and Pacific Coast conference will be discussed by special committees of the two groups at Madison, Wis., June 21. The parley will be held the day after the annual dual track meet between the two conferences at the University of Wisconsin.

The west coast loop recently named a five-man committee headed by Southern California's Hugh C. Willett to discuss renewal of the current five-year agreement which ends after next New Year's game at Pasadena, Calif.

Previously, the Big Ten indicated it was interested in resuming the bowl rivalry which has resulted in four straight Big Ten triumphs and selected a seven-man group to negotiate with the Pacific circuit.

Any conclusions reached by the committees must be approved by the two conferences at later meetings.

CAPILANO STADIUM, June 12—(Special)—The Vancouver Capitanos' George Nicholas threw a shutout at the Salem Senators tonight as the Caps captured a 2-0 win in the opening game of the clubs' Western International league series.

Nicholas gave the Solons seven hits, while the Caps were getting but five off Bill Osborn and replacement Bill Waibel. One of the five, however, was bases-empty home run in the sixth by Charley Mead at the expense of Osborn.

The other Vancouver run in the third inning was unearned. McLean started off with a single and Ray Tren then grounded to Wayne Peterson at third who made a bad throw on an attempted force at second. CLEVELAND, June 12—(AP)—Francisco (Pancho) Segura of Ecuador won the national professional tennis championship tonight by default when leg cramps forced Frank Kovacs of Oakland, Calif., to quit in the fourth set. Segura held a 2-1 advantage in sets and the games of the fourth set were tied at 4—all when the match was called off and Segura declared the winner. Pancho won the first set 6-4, lost the second 6-1 and overcame a 1-4 deficit to win the third set 8-6.

Death Calls Last of Foulis Trio

CHICAGO, June 12—(AP)—David Foulis, 82, last of the three celebrated Foulis brothers from Scotland who organized the first Professional Golfers association of the U. S., is dead. He died yesterday after a 10-day illness. Foulis and his brothers, James and Robert, learned golf craft in Scotland from the noted Tom Morris of Saint Andrew's Royal and Ancient golf club. They came to Chicago in 1895. At that time the city had only one nine-hole links. Soon two new courses opened, the Chicago, with James in charge and David as assistant, and the Onwentsia, with Robert in charge. The brothers worked hard to perfect their courses, instruct converts to the game and manufacture clubs. They became in great demand over the middlewest and laid out courses in many states. David and James in 1903 invented and began manufacturing the mass-produced (now commonly the No. 7 iron) so golfers would have a club to give backspin on the greens to the Haskell ball, one of the first non-solid golf balls.

Ball Coaches Can't Scout for Pro Teams

VICTORIA, B. C., June 12—(AP)—The Pacific Coast conference frowned on some athletes today and smiled upon others in considering petitions for rule relaxations.

George Morgan of UCLA and Gordon Lowe of the University of Washington got a thumbs-down signal on requests for an additional year of eligibility. Morgan's situation was unexplained. Lowe, a member of the Washington crew who had asked his transfer from another school, will not be penalized. George Key, University of Idaho basketball player, was denied a request for waiver of the transfer rule. He argued he had switched to Idaho from a school which did not have an athletic program.

Robert L. Baham, California footballer who was injured after only a few moments of play last season, was granted an extra year of competition. The conference voted to overlook the time played by Frank Gifford, USC football player, while he was ineligible on a technicality.

For Robert Willie, trackman at the University of Oregon, the conference waived the rule that freshman competition must be completed within a calendar year. Illness had forced Willie to split up his freshman year. The PCC reached final action on three matters: 1. A rule was passed barring any coach from acting as a scout for a professional baseball team. 2. Sale of radio rights for the 1950-51 football and basketball

His Boston Braves were nailed for six balks last week—three each by Bob Chipman and Bob Hall. But it was the exception rather than the rule.

Even the New York Yankees' Vic Raschi has slowed down. Vic set a new big league record May 3 when he was "caught in the act" four times by Umpire Bill Summers.

Raschi's season total now is six, tying the all-time record for a season set by a gent named Joe Beckling who pitched for Washington in 1915. One more and Vic goes into the red book too.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 12—(AP)—Straight from the men best qualified to know came the prediction today that Stanford will win the Pacific Coast Conference football championship this fall and ramp into the Rose Bowl.

Grid coaches decided in an informal poll taken during the 1950 summer conference meeting that the Indians from Palo Alto will hit the finish line in front with the Southern California Trojans and California Bears hot on their heels.

Washington drew fourth place, UCLA fifth, followed by Oregon, Oregon State, Washington State and Idaho in that order. Montana, newly resigned to shift to the Mountain States conference, was not included.

All coaches voted with the exception of Lynn Waldorf, California, and Kip Taylor, Oregon State. Taylor said he didn't want to "put anybody on the spot." Waldorf commented he thought there was "too much of this predicting business."
