Work on News Plant Progresses

SILVERTON — Work on the new building for the Silverton Appeal-Tribune on S. Water st. is progressing rapidly. Under direction of contractor-builder John Pfeifer, the concrete was poured for all four walls just two weeks after building operations were begun. Trusses for the rooms have now been put in place, and indications are that the building will be completed before the summer is over.

The building is of reinforced concrete, 40 by 100 feet. A third of the structure will be devoted to news, business and advertising offices while the remainder will be used for the printing plant.

This is the first time in the 70-year history of the paper that it will be housed in a place built expressly for publication use. The building is situated across the street from the city hall on property owned by Mr. and Mrs. Mahlon Hoblitt, publishers of the paper.

It will be modern, well lighted on all sides and calls for off-the-street parking area to accommodate the customers.
