

One Lebanon Patrolman Gets Job Back

LEBANON, June 14—(P)—The rift in Lebanon's police department was settled today when one patrolman was rehired and two new ones hired to fill vacancies created when three officers resigned Saturday.

Police Commissioner Clarence Shimaneck and Police Chief Clifford Price announced the reinstatement of Patrolman Leon Fuller. Howard Jordan, Scio police chief, and Ralph Fetterley, Lebanon business man, were hired to take over the duties of Rex King and John Richardson, who resigned.

Wade Collins, a veteran member of the force, will take over King's duties as assistant police chief. His appointment must be confirmed by the city council.

The three men resigned during the Strawberry festival celebration Saturday over the arrest of an out-of-town man on an intoxication charge. No one has been chosen to succeed Jordan at Scio.

British Labor Criticized for Union Stand

LONDON, June 14—(P)—British labor's halting view of the Schuman plan raised cries of "blundering" in the opposition newspapers today and brought sharp criticism from Europe's socialist parties.

Prime Minister Attlee said yesterday his government wished to help and not hinder the plan to integrate Europe's coal and steel. Attlee held the door open to future cooperation in the plan, but said Britain could not go into it without knowing more about it.

"Folly at the helm!" exclaimed the conservative Daily Graphic today. "What a mess the government have made of their handling of the Schuman proposals! They have blundered from one false position to another. The suspicion is created that the present British government want a socialist plan—and will not accept any other."

Plans Drafted For Expanding City's Schools

Funds to be asked of Salem school district electors in an election Monday would expand or replace all elementary schools of the district eventually, the local school board announced Wednesday.

Plans already drafted call for nine school expansions by the fall of 1951, if the construction funds are approved. The two financial measures on the ballot will be a \$1,000,000 bond issue and a 6-mill tax levy to raise \$2,250,000 over the next 10 years.

The board and citizen advisers have proposed the measures, exclusively for grade school construction, in order to keep pace with school-crowding effects of a rapidly increased birthrate.

If the funds are voted, two school projects are expected to be completed this year—addition of two rooms at Swegle school and addition of either two or four rooms to the new Washington school in the Capitola district.

The Washington and Lincoln schools completed last year were built at minimum size considered possible at the outset of construction, but were built on an expandable plan to permit convenient addition of classrooms in the future.

Plans for next year include addition of six rooms at Highland school, and four more rooms each for Richmond, McKinley, Pringle, Hayesville and Lincoln schools. Some relief for Bush school also is planned next year.

Fire Station Open House Plans Laid

West Salem Lions club will sponsor an open house for the new westside fire station this month, the clubmen decided on Wednesday at a dinner meeting in the Senator hotel.

Tentative date is June 20, although final plans will be worked out with Fire Chief W. P. Roble. The club heard as speaker last night James Banks of the traffic safety office of the Oregon state department. He cautioned members about this year's upturn in highway accidents.

New Orleans Paper Faces Anti-Trust Suit

NEW ORLEANS, June 14—(P)—The New Orleans Times-Picayune and States were accused in a civil anti-trust suit today of monopolistic practices injurious to the competing New Orleans item.

The suit, filed by the justice department in U. S. district court here, is the first civil action ever brought by the government charging a newspaper with injury to a newspaper competitor.

New Taxation Predicted if Bills Passed

New taxes will be levied in Oregon if voters approve a soldiers' bonus and an increased basic school fund in the November elections, State Sen. Howard Belton predicted Wednesday.

Belton, chairman of the 1949 legislative interim tax committee, refused to comment on whether the predicted taxes would be on property, business, a sales tax or an increased state income tax.

Reports indicated that the committee has tentatively approved a business tax proposed offered by State Rep. Giles French, Moro, a committee member. The committee expects to draft a report for the 1951 legislature after several more meetings in Salem and Portland.

The increased basic school support bill, if approved, would add about \$12,000,000 annually to the \$17,000,000 now provided. The proposed veterans' bonus would demand several million dollars each year to pay interest on a \$70,000,000 bond issue.

Belton emphasized that there would not be sufficient income to meet the additional financial burden if the measures are approved. The last property tax in Oregon was collected in 1940. Legislators were reported to be opposed to restoration of this levy.

Sisk Arrested on Forgery Charges

Ervin J. Sisk, 20 Highway ave., was arrested by a Salem police detective Wednesday night on a Marion county district court warrant charging him with forgery.

Police said Sisk is charged with forging several worthless checks in the Salem area in recent months. He was being held Wednesday night in the city jail on \$1,000 bail.
