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Summer Fare

Cookies Become Handy Filler for Family. Guests with Husky Appetites

Come summer company, picnic season and maybe summer weather, and cookies are almost a necessity. In fact, cookies are a year "round" "must" in many families, being a simple and satisfactory way to fill up members of the family who need to be munching on a sweet certain portion of each day.

Icebox cookies are fine for delayed action cooking, but drop cookies are the real time savers. Keep a cookie jar full and your popularity is assured, that is, if the cookie jar is open to all comers.

Here's a good old sugar cookie, with a variation. Instead of the usual white sugar, it takes brown, and instead of being rolled out, it is dropped by spoonful, designed to make the most cookies with the least possible effort.

DROP SUGAR COOKIES

1/2 cup shortening 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup brown sugar (packed) 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg or 2 yolks 1 teaspoon baking powder
1 tablespoon cream or milk 1 1/2 cups flour

Beat sugar with shortening which is at room temperature. Add egg and vanilla, add other ingredients sifted together. Drop from tip of spoon onto cookie sheet one inch apart. Bake at 375 for about 8 minutes. If you want flattened cookies, press with fork and sprinkle with sugar before baking.

The overnight cookie is one which is mixed up and kept on hand for quick baking. Here is one good overnight cookie, suitable for summer eating:

BUTTERSCOTCH OVERNIGHT COOKIE

3 cups brown sugar 1 1/2 cups flour
1 cup melted shortening 2 teaspoons baking powder
3 eggs, beaten 1 teaspoon vanilla
Pinch of salt 1 cup nuts

Cream sugar and shortening, add eggs. Add flour and baking powder sifted together and add vanilla. Knead well, shape into a long roll and let stand overnight in cooler or refrigerator. Slice thin and bake in a 400 degree oven until delicately browned. And finally, a rolled out cookie that takes currants to give it an extra good flavor.

MRS. HINDLEY'S CURRANT COOKIES

1 cup shortening 6 cups or less flour
2 cups brown sugar 1 teaspoon salt
2 eggs 1 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 cup hot water 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup currants Sprinkle of cloves
1 teaspoon soda in water 1/2 teaspoon all-spice

Mix all ingredients together. Roll out and bake immediately, or make into rolls, wrap and let stand overnight in refrigerator, then cut and bake. Bake at 400 degrees for about 12 minutes.

New Fabric Wall Coverings on Market. Have Good Design, Color and Texture

A new group of fabric wall coverings has just come on the market that have good design, color and soft texture for long use in the home. The wall covering is permanently crack resistant, washable and decorative for the home. Soil marks can be washed away with a damp cloth. Both solid and patterned wall coverings are offered in this collection.

One of the most unusual of the patterns is in dyed oak, a wood grain finish that appears bleached and dyed and comes in a wide range of colors from pastels to deep tones of green, red and a blackish brown. It makes a handsome wall background for both modern and traditional furnishings.

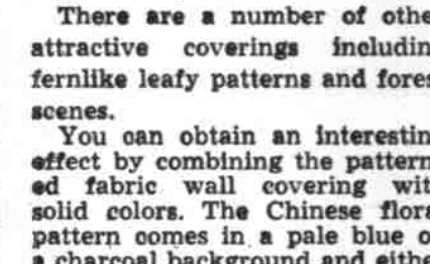
If you like a bold scale pattern, the jungle themes are unusual and so is a Chinese floral pattern which has a full design repeat every 48 inches.

There are a number of other attractive coverings including fernlike leafy patterns and forest scenes.

You can obtain an interesting effect by combining the patterned fabric wall covering with solid colors. The Chinese floral pattern comes in a pale blue on a charcoal background and either color can be picked up and used for other walls in the room.

Among the other color combinations in the patterned coverings are flame with beige and yellow, or light greyish blue with yellow in an off-white. If you want to make an attractive spot out of a guest closet or powder room, this type of wall covering will give you a dramatic, and unusual wall decoration.
