West Canada Rivers Start On Rampage

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 16—(CP)—A new edition of the ruinous 1948 floods threatened dozens of British Columbia communities tonight.

Rivers throughout the province, goring on fast-melting snow from mountain ranges, poured over their banks. The mighty Fraser punched at the 100-mile stretch of dikes protecting fertile farmlands.

Canadian National Railways' transcontinental line was washed out at Cisco, 140 miles north of Vancouver.

Premier Johnson appealed to the army for help.

Most serious threat to the \$11,000,000 Fraser valley dike system was at Agassiz, centre of the 1948 flood fight. More than 200 volunteers, with help from the army, worked feverishly to brace the five-mile stretch of weakened wall with sandbags.

The provincial public works department moved 2,000 sand bags by air from Victoria to Pemberton Meadows, near Lillooet, 120 miles north of Vancouver.

More than 5,000 persons were isolated in the Bridge river area near Lillooet. The main street of Minato was under three to four feet of water and evacuation of the village of 200 was nearly complete tonight.

Plane Crashes Into House in Portland Area

Four persons escaped with minor injuries yesterday in two separate plane crashes in the Portland area.

One plane, piloted by Glen Grantham, 46, Portland, smashed into a southeast Portland residence, broke a window, then bounced off the corner of a house and slammed into a garage, knocking the structure from its foundations.

Grantham and a passenger, Esther Osterbach, 30, Portland, were treated at a hospital for cuts and bruises. Occupants of the house, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Pugh and their 10-month-old son, were sleeping in a bedroom. They were unhurt.

Grantham said the motor failed as he was preparing to land at a nearby airport.

Later, a plane crashed into a field near the airport, taking off from Troh's airport in suburban Portland. Stanley W. Perry, 30, Renton, Wash., and Rex Richards, 31, Seattle, the plane owner, walked away from the wreckage. They were treated for cuts. The plane was demolished.

Southwestern Oregon Leads Census Gains

EUGENE, Ore., June 16—(AP)—Southwestern Oregon, spurred by the shift of lumbering to this timber-rich area, has made the biggest population gain of any area in the country tabulated thus far.

That was reported here today by Gene Harris, census supervisor for the northwest and Alaska. He said the seven counties of southwestern Oregon had grown 58.55 per cent since 1940.

Much of the gain was registered by small towns growing up fast. Springfield, for instance, had 3805 residents ten years ago. It now has 10,771. Eugene skyrocketed from 20,838 to 35,672. Lumbering was the reason for both cities' growth. The same industry pushed Roseburg from 4924 to 8205.

Harris pointed out that the role of this part of Oregon as the biggest gainer might be overshadowed when some other areas, particularly in California, make their census reports.

Linn county has increased 79.9 per cent, to 53,623. One of the towns in that county—Sweet Home—made a phenomenal 232 per cent growth, and now totals 3,620 inhabitants. Albany has grown 78.1 per cent to 10,076, and Lebanon 113.6 per cent to 5,829.

Harris listed these totals for counties:

Cos., 41,558; Curry 5997; Douglas 54,064; Jackson 57,831; Josephine 26,313; Lane 124,948; and Linn 53,623.

City totals include: Cottage Grove 3521; Junction City 1466; Astoria 1555; Florence 1013; Coquille 693; Creswell 660; Albany 10,076; Coos Bay 5956; North Bend 5860; Grants Pass 7980; Medford 17,176; Roseburg 8205; Yoncalla 626.

Asland reported a 62 per cent increase with a population of 7702.

Demos to Form Campaign Board

PORTLAND, June 16—(AP)—A democratic campaign committee, modeled after national lines, will be formed in Salem July 1, Democratic State Chairman William L. Josselin said today.

He said the organization would work for the election of Oregon's democratic candidates. A permanent chairman and secretary will be elected to spearhead the campaign.

Grange Rejects Brannan Plan

ONTARIO, Ore., June 16—(AP)—The Oregon State Grange rejected the Brannan farm plan today and endorsed the National Grange's program for supporting farm prices.

Delegates to the annual convention voted 2 to 1 for the grange plan, after hearing both sides of the argument.

Saw Cuts Off Boy's Finger

A power saw cut off the tip of an 11-year-old Salem boy's little finger Friday afternoon and almost severed his ring finger.

The city first aid squad took Bobby Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Jones, 1690 S. Church st., to Salem Memorial hospital where he was treated and released. First aid men reported the youngster apparently was playing with the saw at the home of a neighbor.

The squad also patched up Rudolph Doll, 35, 162 Fairhaven ave., who stepped on a nail, puncturing his foot.

Air Defense Test Planned

SEATTLE, June 16—(AP)—There will be upward of 150 planes when "operation whistkopf" starts Sunday.

That's the name of the Pacific northwest air defense test announced at Washington, D.C., today.

Li. Col. Theodore R. Clink, scales, assistant deputy for operations of the western air command force from Hamilton Field in California, made the estimate of 150 planes.

He said that for his strikes on northwest targets, the "invader" will use medium and heavy bombers.

Truman Signs DP Measure

WASHINGTON, June 16—(AP)—President Truman signed with "very great pleasure" today a bill extending the displaced persons law another year and opening the way for the entry of an additional 136,000 homeless to the United States.

"Now," he said, "the post-war victims of totalitarianism will be on an equal footing with earlier victims of Nazi aggression."

The legislation, more than a year in the writing, liberalizes and extends for another 12 months a 1948 law which was due to expire June 30.

Up to 341,000 displaced persons seek admission under the new law, compared with 208,000 under the expiring legislation. Some 153,000 DPs already have come here to carve out new careers.

Charming, poised Nancy Ann Miller gracefully accepted the symbols of her reign as Queen of Cherryland Friday night at coronation ceremonies at the state fairgrounds.

The 17-year-old brunette, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Burr Miller of Salem, officially became Queen as she received the crown from Paul Hale, King Bing of the Salem Cherrylands.

Scores of colorful costumed men, women and children preceded her entrance as attendants and performers to the royal court of Cherryland last night.

The pretty queen in royal robe of white and cherry red knelt to receive the crown, then extended her greetings to her court and a crowd of 4,000 at the fairgrounds grandstand.

Escorted by Cherrians

Her princesses were escorted by honor escorts from the ranks of the Cherrians—Patricia Kirk of St. Paul by Cherrian Hunt Clark; Martha Storruss of Silverton by Marvin Van Cleave; Dwyann Ann Herberger, Sacred Heart, by Henry Arens, and Marlene Hartman, Sublimity, by Wallace Doerflinger.

Former Queen Patricia O'Connor presented the scepter; Mayor R. L. Elstrom gave the new queen the key to the city and Thomas L. McCall gave her the seal of Oregon on behalf of Gov. Douglas McKay.

Court Chaperone Mrs. Arthur Weddie was escorted in the coronation procession by Cherrian Fred Starrett. Official courts with their guests were present also from St. Paul and Oregon City, and "Duchesses" from this area included Vera Pantle of Woodburn and Margaret Nicholson of Aumsville.

Presents Mounted Drill

Salem Saddle club presented an intricate mounted drill as prelude to the coronation. The Capitol post drum corps in Indian dress also performed. Colors and honor groups from many other local organizations were in the coronation procession.

Prior to the coronation, a dancing revue was presented by students of the Paul Armstrong studio, ranging from tapping by the tiny tots to ballet numbers and other specialties. Nearly 100 boys and girls performed.

Other Armstrong dancers will give performances in similar revues at 7:30 tonight and 7:45 Tuesday night.
