Money in the Bag

Potato Chip Business a Big One for American Farmer and Housewife, too

There's money in potato chips, when you consider that they are getting around \$2 a pound for potatoes and there are 300 million pounds sold in the United States in a year.

That, I repeat, runs into money. Potato chips are important to the American farmer, not only because of the number of potatoes sold, but because of the consumption of vegetable oils. In the mid-thirties, the industry used only about three million bushels of raw potatoes yearly, now it's 20 million bushels. Fats and oils now used for cooking are estimated to be 120 million pounds per year.

Potato chip dealers have added glamor to their product, and perhaps this has something to do with their popularity. Packaging, of course, is attractive, displays are everywhere, and even the style of cutting has been glamorized.

Of course the place of the Saratoga chip is primarily on a cold plate or salad, it is tops as a picnic potato and good as a snack. But potato chips appeared one time in a loaf for casserole dish and became popular overnight. Few other main dishes seem to have been made with chips but here's that one which enjoyed such deserved popularity for awhile. Perhaps you had forgotten.

TUNA, POTATO CHIP LOAF
1 package potato chips ½ cup condensed mushroom soup
1 can tuna 1 cup water
½ cup water Chopped olives
Pat the potato chips lightly to crush them. Add flaked tuna and combine other ingredients lightly, using either cut up stuffed or ripe olives. Bake in greased loaf tin at 325 for about one hour.

Potato chips have become a regular addition to the snack plate in recent years. Several ways of serving have proved popular.

TOASTED POTATO CHIPS
Sprinkle the chips with paprika and grated Parmesan cheese, toast in the oven lightly at 400 degrees.

POTATO CHIPS WITH CHEESE
Work Roquefort cheese or soft cream cheese to a soft paste and season with paprika and Worcestershire sauce. Spread on the crisp chips and serve immediately before they soften.

Although all the many kindred products available now in the market don't help the potato growers any, they do help the housewife to vary her feeding program.

There are, aside from the regulation potato chips and lettuce, potatoes, onion, cheese, shrimp and tomato curls. They compare in effect to the potatoes, but are different of course in flavor. Corn curls, another kindred product is also gaining in popularity for outdoor meals or salad plates.

What happens to every writer happened to us Friday. A recipe which we promised as a good one may turn out to be a bit soft, if women followed our recipe appearing in the paper. Flour was insufficient, but here's the corrected recipe.

BUTTERSCOTCH OVERNIGHT COOKIE
3 cups brown sugar 6 cups flour
1 cup melted shortening 2 teaspoons baking powder
1 egg, beaten 1 teaspoon vanilla
Pinch of salt 1 cup nuts
Cream sugar and shortening, add eggs. Add flour and baking powder sifted together and add vanilla. Knead well, shape into a long roll and let stand overnight in cooler or refrigerator. Slice thin and bake in a 400 degree oven until delicately browned.
