SAN FRANCISCO, June 12 (AP)—The San Francisco Seals swept a Pacific Coast league doubleheader with Portland today, 9-5 and 6-4. Two run homers by Dino Restelli and Joe Grace sparked the nightcap victory. Al Lien chalked up his tenth victory of the season despite three Beaver homers but had to get help from Con Dempsey in the seventh inning of the first game.

Lanky Cliff Melton went all the way in the seven-inning second game. The Seals drove the Beavers' Roy Helsler to the showers in the fourth.

Pitcher Vince DeBiasi, who came in during the second frame, suffered his fourth defeat of the season when the Seals drove him out in the sixth.

Portland's homers off Lien were a fourth-inning lead-off blow by Rightfielder Joe Brovia and successive clouds by Second Baseman Eddie Bassinski and Glad in the sixth.

In other games the Oakland Oaks topped San Diego 8-5 in the first game but dropped the nightcap 7-0. Los Angeles whipped Seattle 11-1 then lost the finale by a 1-0 count. Eight homers were walloped in the first Los Angeles-Seattle game—six by the Rainiers—to bring the week's total to 27 for a new Wrigley Field record. Mangrum Tops Par Again To Snare 'Robin' Event

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., June 18 (AP)—Lloyd Mangrum of Chicago shot his fifth consecutive sub-par round over the Wykagyl course today to win the Palm Beach Round Robin Golf tournament going away.

Sixteen strokes under perfect figures for the 90 holes of play, the trim star from the Tam O'Shanter links wound up the exacting test with a "plus" score of 37 points and a clear margin of 17 points over his closest rival among 15 rival professionals, Lawson Little of Monterey, Calif.

The \$3,000 first prize boosted Mangrum's winnings within a three-week period to \$8,100, probably the most money ever won by a golfer in a similar space. He won \$2,800 in the Fort Wayne open two weeks ago and \$2,500 for placing second to Ben Hogan in the Open championship last week at Ardmore, Pa.

He shot five truly fine rounds in the past four days—70-70-65-68-71—344. Par for Wykagyl is 72, or 360 for 90 holes. The only man who ever bettered Mangrum's mark in the Round Robin was Bobby Locke, the South African, who posted a total of 340 in winning the event a year ago.

The only fight which existed during the hot afternoon was for second money of \$2,000. Little, who led the set back after three rounds but had fallen back to sixth place going into today's play, pulled himself together and clicked off a hot 70 to pick up the marbles.

Claude Harmon, with a final round of 73 and a plus of 15, finished third for \$1,200.
