700 Students Register at OCE Session

MONMOUTH, June 19—More than 700 students registered in the first day of summer session at Oregon College of Education today. A few more are expected to complete registration in the next few days, to bring the student roster to one of the highest totals in the last 15 years.

R. E. Ljeuallen, registrar, announced the tentative figure which includes a group of 30 Oregonians, who will tour Europe under the leadership of Prof. Charles Noxon, OCE geographer. The group will visit places of interest on the continent as part of a workshop course carrying academic credit.

More than 100 course offerings are listed at OCE, with 20 visiting educators from 12 states joining the resident faculty. Special workshops are offered in physical education, art in the elementary school, teaching of the language arts, elementary science and the European group.

O&C Timber Sold at Salem For \$142,790

A total of 6,340,000 board feet of timber on O&C land was sold at oral auction here Monday for \$142,790.

The timber is located on about 195 acres of railroad grant land in four tracts, administered by the federal bureau of land management, in Yamhill and Tillamook counties. District Forester A. P. Collins of Salem conducted the sale.

Williamina Lumber company entered a high bid of \$24 per thousand feet for 5,080,000 board feet of Douglas fir for a total purchase price of \$121,920. Hurl Brothers Logging company of Williamina made the highest bid of \$25 on a small parcel in Tillamook county. Eagle and Worth Logging company of McMinnville was top bidder at \$12.75 on a small parcel in Yamhill county and Murphy Timber company of Portland entered a high bid of \$20.75 on Douglas fir in Tillamook county.

The sale Monday brings the total amount of timber sold in the Salem forest district since July 1, 1949, to about 62,000,000 board feet for \$1,006,400.

Four additional tracts in this district located in Clackamas, Yamhill, Marion and Benton counties will be offered for sale by sealed bid today at the Portland office of the regional administrator, Collins said. The timber totals about 3,000,000 board feet and is offered at a total minimum bid of \$32,161.

Guard Planes Land at Salem

Eleven airplanes, attempting to participate in air national guard and air force maneuvers, surprised Salem Monday with a morning visit. They made landings here because of fog at Portland airport, out of which they were scheduled to operate.

Ten F-51 fighters from Walla Walla airport, center of the maneuvers, arrived here about 8 a. m., commanded by Lt. Col. Gordon Doolittle of Portland. A B-26 arrived shortly before noon. All left about 12:40 p. m.

4 Sentences Meted Out in Circuit Court

Four men were sentenced to jail terms or probationary periods, Monday by Circuit Judge George R. Duncan of Marion county.

Those sentenced were: Carl A. Glunz, who pleaded guilty to charge of obtaining money by false pretenses, sentenced to six months in county jail, not effective until June 26 to give defendant time to clear affairs.

William R. Gregson, who pleaded guilty to charge of obtaining money by false pretenses, sentenced to one year in county jail, with credit for 229 days served awaiting sentence.

Frank Hickman, who had pleaded guilty to charge of non-support, given six-months suspended jail sentence and placed on probation for three years.

Edwin L. Darling, one of 17 youths arrested early this month on charges involving a long string of burglaries, pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary not in a dwelling and was sent to the state hospital for 30 days' observation.

State to Begin Anti-Budworm Drive Today

The spruce budworm will be the target today when airplanes begin at dawn in the Heppner area of Oregon to spray thousands of acres of the state's valuable timber land.

The planes will fly from 75 to 200 feet above the solid blocks of timber, spraying DDT to control the budworm, George Spaur, state forester, said Monday. Four hundred fifty thousand acres of forests are due to pass under the low flying planes before the million dollar project is completed.

From 20 to 30 take-offs and landings each hour will take place at some of the airstrips in the Heppner-Kinzua-La Grande area, John B. Woods, jr., forester in charge of the undertaking, reported.

Irene Dunne in Britain; Presented at Court

KEW, Eng., June 19 (AP)—Hollywood Actress Irene Dunne, who came to England to play the role of Queen Victoria, got some royal tips for the part at a Sunday tea here. She was presented to King George VI and Queen Elizabeth.

It was the first time that Britain's reigning monarch has met an American actress in private audience.
