American Tennis Stars Dominate London Event

LONDON, June 19 (AP)—American tennis stars dominated play today in the opening rounds of the London championships at Queens club, a tuneup for the Wimbledon championships which start Monday.

The London tournament has lost some of its importance this year since most of the American and Australian male stars decided to stay out of the singles play. Louise Brough, last year's Wimbledon champion, moved into the third round when Pamela Ward, Britain, defaulted. Louise had a first-round bye.

Doris Hart, of Jacksonville, Fla., whipped Miss E. M. Andrews, Britain, 6-0, 6-1, and Mrs. Pat Todd of LaJolla, Calif., defeated Mrs. G. R. Lines, 7-5, 6-3. Nancy Chaffee of Ventura, Calif., made an impressive first appearance in British lawn tennis by trouncing Mrs. Betty Court, Britain, 6-1, 6-1, in a first round match. Mrs. Martha Barnett, Coral Gables, Fla., lost to Miss J. W. Stork, Britain, 6-3, 6-1, in the second round.

Vic Seixas of Philadelphia won his opening match over N. Katzen, Britain, 6-2, 6-2.

Angling Enthusiasts Shouldn't Miss Fiorini

You fellows who like your fly-rod fishing shouldn't miss the for-free demonstrations by Seattle's Buzz Fiorini at the I-Walton clubhouse Wednesday evening. The man is an expert at flipping lure and line from a spinning reel. He has done better than 100 yards in a single cast with steelhead gear. He borrowed Village Nate Buell's rod in a Seattle exhibition recently and proceeded to amaze onlookers during a sports show there, proof that no stickwicks are included in Buzz's makeup.

Last year Fiorini landed no less than 200 salmon with spinning tackle (he tossed 205 of 'em back, incidentally, so is a true sportsman), and on May 16 of this year landed 11 of 20 salmon he hooked with spinning gear, including a mere 3-pound test line. Buzz isn't a professional showman exclusively. He's actually a fishing guide in Washington and has become so good at handling his spinning gear that various sports organizations are beginning to put him on exhibition. Buell was largely instrumental in obtaining Fiorini for the Wednesday visit, along with the many fishing tackle dispensers in Salem.

Notice the real oddity in the NCAA track and field classic Saturday at Minneapolis? Not often do you hear of two sprinters ending in a tie in any race even if they try, let alone both being from the same school. Yet both Dave Henthorne and Bill Fell of Oregon gave 'em a dead heat finish for sixth place in the century romp Saturday.
