

Many Groups, from Cub Scouts To Salem Service Organizations, Contributed to 1950 Pageant

Scores of Salem area organizations joined forces in presenting the Pageant of Progress nightly performances this week as final events of the 1950 Cherryland festival.

With a cast of local actors totalling some 1,500, the responsibility for getting out talent for the 17 separate episodes was divided among these organizations—ranging from groups of young Cub Scouts and girl Bluebirds and Brownies to service and patriotic orders and such established musical groups as the local oratorio society.

The opening episode of early Indian days featured talent from the Young Matrons, Pythian Sisters, YMCA, Capital post drum corps, Civic Players, Junior Catholic Daughters, Brownies, Cubs and Chemawa Indian school.

As the scene changed to the coming of white hunters and trappers, men from the Saddle club and Knights of Pythias appeared on stage.

A new episode centering in the arrival of Jason Lee to found the first mission and the institute which is now Willamette university, as well as establishment of the first Catholic mission, brought into the action members of Salore club, the local Ministerial association, Knights of Columbus, Catholic Daughters and Willamette university.

As settlers began arriving in covered wagons in the Salem area, the pageant action featured the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs and, in a scene of dancing merriment, the Hill Anthony Hill Billies. The gold rush scene which followed featured Eagles, Delta Gamma alumnae, Capital post Legion auxiliary and Armstrong dancers in the can-can number.

Development of public education, centered in an early-day one-room schoolhouse, was portrayed by Progressive club, Willamette university, St. Joseph school, Detroit Damsters and others. In the scene built around location of the Oregon capitol at Salem there were actors from the Legion auxiliary, Hollywood Lions, Kelzer grange, Salem Heights square dancers and Legion post 136.

The Capital City ballet, a dancing interlude, was staged by the Merlain dancing school and the Tri-Y. Salem churches, East Salem Lions, Veterans of Foreign Wars and auxiliary joined in the episode denoting religious roots of Salem.

Statehood made for another colorful scene, in which participants represented Order of Amaranth, Delta Gamma, Saddle club, Merlain dancing school and Wiltsey accordion school.

The old-time ice cream social and Fourth of July celebration which identified the 90's and 1900's brought into action men, women and children from Civic Players, Elks, Woman's club, Junior Women's club, Salem Gatekeepers, Hollywood Lions, Pythian Sisters, Sons of Norway and Salem high school.

Sponsors of the "To These Our Thanks" ballet theme were Job's daughters, Kiwanis and Junior Women's club.

The stirring military scene featuring the flag raising on Mt. Suribachi was presented by representatives from many local military branches and veterans organizations.

Burning of the statehouse provided theme of another episode, with participants from Salem Lions club, National Secretaries association, Business and Professional Women.

Dozens of youth groups joined in the episode on "Our Future Guardians" and the finale. Besides those groups already noted there were participants from Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Leslie flag twirl-

Albany School Elects Wiseman

ALBANY—Orville Wiseman, incumbent, won over Dalton Gibbs in the election for director of school district 5, comprising the Albany city school district, Monday. With a total of 1241 votes cast, Wiseman received 675 to Dalton's 556.

At the same election, the vote on the kindergarten school carried by a vote of 731 to 424. At the present time such a school is not being planned for the immediate future, but the vote came up to ascertain the mind of the people regarding such an institution when funds may become available for the enterprise.

The vote is one of the heaviest for a school election here in several years. With the polls being open from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m. (DST) the board did not finish counting until after 1 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Boatmen Beat River Rapids

GRAND CANYON, Ariz., June 21.—(AP)—Battered and exhausted from a nine-day battle against the turbulent Colorado river, five adventurous boatmen today completed their death-challenging expedition through Grand Canyon.

Otis Marston of Berkeley, Calif., leader of the expedition, called it the "worst" of the five runs he has made down the raging stream. This was the 22nd expedition down the river since 1889. Ten men have lost their lives defying the Colorado.

Seven men set out from Lees ferry, 345 miles upstream from Hoover dam, June 12 in two boats on this expedition. One of the crafts was set adrift after developing engine trouble about midway in the trip. Two members of the party, Ed Hudson and his son, Ed, Jr., Paso Robles, Calif., were left behind.
