Screening of Teachers at School Asked

Improved quality of elementary education through closer screening of teachers at training institutions was called for Wednesday by Dr.

Henry M. Gunn, president of Oregon College of Education, in a talk to Salem Rotary club.

Gunn declared Oregon's shortage of elementary teachers would be over within two years. He pointed out that various groups have calculated about 1,150 persons will be available to fill the state's 1,100 grade school teaching vacancies next school year. These include, he said, a large number of former teachers returning to instructional

positions.

With the end of the need for quantity training, the educator said the teacher-training schools should switch to emphasis on quality.

He urged also that elementary schools should teach citizenship as well as the "three Rs."

Lot Decides Winners of Primary Vote

Candidates for a state and a county office have been decided by drawings as the result of the votes in the recent primary elec-

tion, the state bureau of election was informed Wednesday.

Vernon Wilson, republican candidate for state representative from Malheur county, was chosen also as democratic candidate. He had received the same number of white-in votes as Ernest Metcalf. No one had filed officially for the democratic nomination.

In Morrow county, Phil Mahoney, local attorney, was selected as democratic nominee for district

attorney via a drawing. Bradley Francher, republican nominee for the office had received an equal number of write-in votes.

Mahoney has stated publicly that he does not desire the nomination. Under state law the drawing was mandatory, but Mahoney may now file a notice of withdrawal from the candidacy.
