## Toughening Of Driving Laws Urged

More stringent penalties for driving while intoxicated will be proposed to the 1951 legislature by Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry, he said Wednesday. He is aiming the changes at habitual violators, particularly.

Greatest change on his recommendation would be a 30-day suspension of driver's license for first conviction, 90 days on second conviction and all-time revocation to follow third conviction.

The law now provides for revocation of the license following conviction but permits the person involved to reapply for a driver's license at any time after the conviction provided his application carries a recommendation from the convicting magistrate.

Newbry said the current law is unfair to the judges because in many drunken driving cases the judges are subject to considerable pressure on the part of the person whose license has been revoked and his friends.

Records show that during the fiscal year ended July 1, 1949, a total of 3,672 drivers' licenses were revoked after conviction for driving while intoxicated. This averages 300 a month. Newbry said the number of revocations is increasing instead of diminishing.

"It is my opinion the proposed amendment would take care of habitual violators," Newbry averred. "The 30-day suspension would prove an adequate warning and the 90-day suspension for second violation would be severe enough to warn the violator of what he might expect on third conviction."

Another amendment under consideration by the secretary of state would provide for all-time revocation of driver's license of any person convicted of a felony committed with the aid of an automobile.

This proposed amendment, Newbry said, would make it more hazardous for criminals to use cars when bent on committing a crime.

Police officers were said to favor the latter amendment.

Nelson was born June 4, 1882, in Sweden where he served three years in the King's Guard before coming to the United States when he was 24 years old. A stonecutter by trade, he lived many years in Wisconsin before moving to Salem about 1922.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Hattie E. Nelson, Salem; a son, Fabian Nelson, Coquille; a step-daughter, Adeline Thele, Brooks; and three step-sons, John, Grover and William Wilson, all of Salem.

Funeral services will be arranged by the Clough-Barrick chapel.
