Learn to Wrap Your Gifts at Home. Wrapping Process Given in Five Steps

There's one skill that always comes in handy, and that is the ability to wrap gifts in your home for festive occasions. It always gives an added touch of importance to a gift in a special wrapping and if you have small children or adults whom you want to please at birthdays, showers, or holidays, you should learn how to do your own packing.

George A. Taffel, an expert in the gift wrapping field, has broken down the wrapping process into five steps that are easy to follow. He advises you to keep plenty of white tissue paper on hand, so you can line a box which, when opened, will then

have a neat appearance. You place a single sheet of the tissue length of the box, and overlap it in the center for fit. Another sheet across the width will give you all the lining you need. The second step is cutting the paper to fit the outside of the box. Center the pattern if it has one and make sure there is plenty of paper, but not so much as to make the overlap clumsy. It is easier if you can put the box top down, but otherwise, the overlap can be covered with ribbon. Scotch tape will hold the paper in place.

The third step is folding the ends inward, making neat creases, and the fourth is bringing the flaps down and securing them with tape. When tying the ribbon — last step — leave ends long enough to tie on a separate decorative bow. Taffel suggests the diagonal tie as the most attractive.

INTO A CORNER

There's more room in a room if the corners are used, and here's a way to set up a corner arrangement in style. Design the windows into the corner plan, to fit the furniture arrangement as neatly as if there were corner windows. Build shelves between the windows, right around the corner. Build a cornice to go over everything, windows and shelves. Make the whole group as important looking as you can. Make it look wider than it is by starting the cornice on the wall beyond the window edges rather than directly over the windows. Make the windows look taller than they are by starting the cornice on the wall above the window tops. Paint the shelves the wall color or to match the background color of the curtains and work out an eye-catching arrangement on the shelves with small decorative treasures and plants.
