Coffee Tables Utilitarian, Attractive, Become an Important Part of Home

You'd never recognize today's new coffee tables as descendants of grandmother's informal piece of furniture for that afternoon tea or coffee tray. In recent years the coffee table has become an important part of American homes. You will find it in the living room of small apartments and even in large homes, where, except for formal meals, the small table is given a great deal of use.

Many of the modern styles today come from California where designers have made the coffee table a utilitarian and attractive addition to the home. Lorin Jackson is one of the top designers of

budget-priced tables. One of his tables is in a blonde finish oak, which hardly shows any dust. It was a dual-self design with a compartment for the storage of magazines and books. There is also ample space for cigarettes, ash trays, flowers, drinks and other objects.

Another Jackson table design, also in the inexpensive group, has a parquet oak veneer surface finished in a rich brown tone. A glass shelf, which gives a suspended look to a table lamp placed on the top, is worked into the wooden frame, about a foot above the wooden table top. You can use the glass shelf for ash trays, liquids, and other objects that might stain wooden surfaces. The glass also allows free vision through to magazines and the like, which you might place on the wood part of the table below. Other new tables feature cork or plastic tops, which are alcohol resistant.
