Muffin Fun

Maple Syrup, Apples or Orange Rind Give Glamor to Hot Breads

One of the greatest sports in cooking is seeing how many variations one can make of a recipe. Now take biscuits for instance, we've reviewed many a way you can vary the basic recipe for biscuits, but you can make some interesting variations of muffins too. Here are several, not all from one recipe, but variations possible for your own favorite.

Apple muffins would make a good breakfast hot bread, especially designed for company a company meal:

APPLE MUFFINS
(12 to 16 muffins)
2 cups flour
1/2 cup sugar
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
Sift dry ingredients together, add apples, mix. Add combined liquid ingredients, mixing just enough to moisten. Pour into buttered muffin pans, filling two-thirds full. Sprinkle with the following crunch:

1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup nut meats, chopped
Bake in a hot oven 400 degrees 15 minutes.
Maple syrup is the sweetening for this muffin, good to serve with bacon and eggs for supper.

MAPLE SYRUP MUFFINS
(12 to 16 muffins)
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg, well beaten
Sift dry ingredients together, add combined liquid ingredients, mixing just enough to moisten. Pour into well-buttered muffin pans, filling two-thirds full. Bake in a hot oven 400 degrees 20 minutes.

Oatmeal makes muffins have an extra taste in this recipe.

OATMEAL MUFFINS
(12 to 16 muffins)
1 cup milk, scalded
2 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup oatmeal, uncooked
3 tablespoons sugar
Melt butter in hot milk, pour over oatmeal, let stand 3 minutes. Add sugar, salt and egg. Add sifted dry ingredients, mixing just enough to moisten. Fill buttered muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake in a hot oven 400 to 425 degrees 25 minutes.

And the addition of orange rind gives this a bit of glamor:

ORANGE RAISIN MUFFINS
(12 to 16 muffins)
2 cups flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup seedless raisins
1/2 teaspoon orange rind, grated
1/2 cup orange juice, strained
1 egg, well beaten
1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk
1/2 cup butter, melted
Sift dry ingredients together three times. Add raisins and orange rind. Add combined liquid ingredients, mixing just enough to moisten. Fill buttered muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake in a hot oven 400 to 425 degrees 25 minutes.

IDEA FOR LENGTHENING TOO SHORT DRAPERIES

Swing those high water draperies to the floor this way—or try this idea for brand new draperies simply because you like it. If the draperies you have are too short for the window, this design can add as much as five inches to their length. And it's a lengthening method that switches the draperies to a smart styling that's used in decorator-designed model rooms. Stitch together 1 1/2-inch double strips of the drapery fabric, or use a plain color to match the drapery or a flat tape if none of the original fabric is available. Attach loops of the stitched fabric or the tape to the back of each pinch pleat group, and hang the drapery from the loops on a pole fixture. To make a short window look longer, set the pole high on the wall above the window—if, of course, the draperies will still reach the floor.

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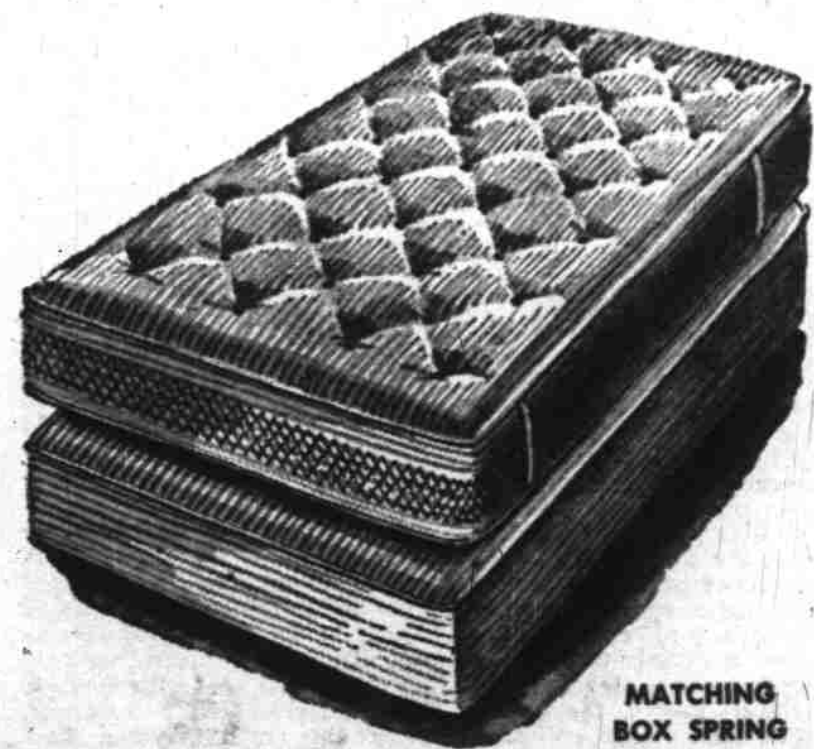
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
