

## News of Korea Attack Bursts Over Tokyo

TOKYO, June 25 (AP)—The news of communist North Korea's invasion of the south burst like a bombshell today in this U. S. outpost in the Pacific.  
Key U. S. officers were called back from golf games and week ends at the beach.  
General MacArthur was kept fully informed of latest developments, but thus far he had made no comment on the dramatic development.  
Japanese heard the news with considerable excitement and concern. It was generally felt among them that if the attack proceeds seriously it would end any chance for an early peace treaty for Japan.  
This was indicated by Secretary Johnson before he left Japan. He said that in view of the communist conquest of China and "the delicate situation in Korea" the United States would have to maintain all points in her defense line.  
Johnson also said while he had some statements concerning the U. S. position in the Far East had been invalidated by the communist victory in China and had modified earlier talk about a quick peace for Japan.  
Presumably the latest development in Korea might well do the same thing again.

## Death Claims Roy T. Bishop, Industrialist

Roy T. Bishop who died Saturday in Portland, was born April 6, 1881 at Crawfordville, Oregon, the son of Charles P. and Fannie Kay Bishop. His paternal grandfather was the Rev. William R. Bishop, a teacher and circuit riding preacher of the Cumberland Presbyterian church. His maternal grandfather was Thomas Kay, founder of the Kay Woolen Mills at Salem.  
The Bishop family removed to McMinnville in 1884 and from 1889 to 1890 resided in Portland, then coming to Salem where C. P. Bishop founded the Bishop Woolen Mills Store which is still in operation as Bishop's men's furnishing store, on Liberty street.  
Deciding to follow the textile manufacturing business Roy Bishop attended the Philadelphia Textile school, finishing the course in 1903. In 1909 the Bishops took over the Pendleton Woolen Mills at Pendleton and Roy became an officer of the company and a resident of Pendleton. He was vice president of the company at the time of his death. He was one of the organizers of the Pendleton Round-Up in 1910 and originated and directed the Indian section for which the show has become famous.  
In 1919 he moved to Portland, becoming president of the Oregon Worsteds Mill with headquarters at McLoughlin boulevard. He has been a leading figure in the woolen and worsted manufacturing industry of the northwest for many years.  
On June 4, 1913 Mr. Bishop was married to Miss Wilma Burnester in Salt Lake City. She survives as do three children: Jane B. Reville, of Portland, temporarily residing at Pelham Manor, N.Y., and Thomas B. and William H. of Portland; and by six grandchildren. He leaves also one brother, Clarence M. Bishop of Portland and four nephews. Mr. Bishop was a member of the Portland Rotary club.

## Salem Artist Wins First Prize in National Contest

The Latham foundation has awarded a national first prize art award to a Salem girl, it was learned here Saturday.  
Geraldine Wolf, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Wolf, Salem route 7, has been awarded first prize in the student group for her submission of two humane posters in a national art contest. Her prize is \$100 and a certificate of merit.  
Miss Wolf is a student of Art Instruction, Inc., Minneapolis, Minn., a correspondence school. She was a student at Salem high school. She hopes to work in the art line after completion of her present course.

## Living Costs Take Highest Jump in 2 Years

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Led by meat prices, the cost of living between April 15 and May 15 took the highest jump of any month in almost two years, the bureau of labor statistics said today. But it was still below a year ago.  
An increase of .8 of one per cent was reported by the bureau in its consumers' price index on retail prices of goods and services purchased by moderate-income families in large cities. The new index of May 15 was 168.6 compared to 100 for the base period considered normal 1935 to 1939.  
Food prices went up 1.9 per cent between April and May, and were responsible for the sudden rise in the cost of living index.  
Meats especially rose more than the usual seasonal movement. Meat prices were seven per cent higher.  
The index was .4 of one per cent lower than a year ago, but 28.5 per cent higher than in June, 1946, when OPA controls were abandoned, and 11 per cent above the level of August 1939—the month before war broke out in Europe.  
There were fractional increases in rents and miscellaneous goods and services. On the other hand, fuel, electricity and refrigeration prices dropped 1.8 per cent, house furnishings declined slightly and apparel prices were unchanged during the month.  
The separate index on retail food prices was 200.3 per cent of the 1935-39 average—one per cent lower than a year ago but more than 37 per cent above the June, 1946, level.  
The big rise in meat prices brought the index for meats to a level five per cent above a year earlier. In April meat prices averaged two per cent lower than a year earlier. And last fall prices were about nine per cent below those of the previous year.

## Motorcyclists Hit Truck in Aumsville Area

A Mill City couple was reported in "fair" condition at Salem Memorial hospital Saturday night where they were taken following a head-on crash between their motorcycle and a truck near Aumsville about 9 a.m. Saturday.  
The injured were Paul Vincent, 48, and his wife, Helen, 33. Both suffered multiple fractures in the accident, hospital officials reported.  
The couple crashed into a truck operated by Wilbur Scott Ankeny, 2095 S. Winter st., on a curve near the junction of highway 222 and the Aumsville cutoff, state police reported Ankeny was unhurt.

## Six Silverton Persons Hurt, Car Hits Train

Six members of a Silverton family were injured, two of them seriously early Saturday morning when their Chevrolet sedan crashed into an empty logging train near the North Santiam station.  
In Salem Memorial hospital with serious injuries were Mrs. Mary L. Fisher, 23, and her one-year-old daughter, Susan. The baby suffered a fractured skull. Another child, LeRoy Fisher, 4, incurred cuts and bruises and was kept at the hospital for observation. All were described as in "fair" condition Saturday night.  
Also injured, but released were Joe Fisher, husband of Mrs. Fisher, and two other children, Vincent, 6, and Judy, 2.  
Fisher, who was driving the car, said he did not see the train until his 1936 Chevrolet was almost to the track about 3 a.m. Saturday. He said all occupants of the car were thrown out as it was dragged along the track by the canyon-bound train. Fisher's brother, driving another car just behind, brought the injured family to the hospital here.  
Fisher said the three oldest children were asleep in the back of the car at the time of the crash. Mrs. Fisher was holding the baby in the front seat, he said.

## Brothers Hit Cars Head-On; 6 Persons Hurt

Six persons were injured, none seriously, late Saturday night in a head-on collision of cars driven by two Jefferson brothers at the junction of Skyline and Liberty roads south of Salem.  
Driver of a northbound Dodge was Joe Wood, Jefferson route 1. His car was hit by a southbound 1947 Pontiac operated by his brother, James V. Wood, of the same address. James was returning to his home from Salem when the accident occurred. Joe Wood was en-route to Salem.  
Brother James said he saw two youngsters in the road and slammed on his brakes. His car skidded down the grade directly in front of the Liberty canner and into the northbound car. He suffered head cuts and bruises.  
Occupants of the car operated by Joe Wood, were his wife, Margy, Jim Polston, 670 Hansen ave., and the two Wood children, Judy

## Search Continues For Missing Men

TOKYO, Sunday, June 25 (AP)—A wide ocean search for two men missing from a ditched superfortress today entered its fourth day southeast of Guam.  
Eight other members of the crew of 11 were rescued from lifeboats or liferafts. A ninth was found dead in a life preserver, the air force said.  
The airman's body was found near where the B-29 was forced to land Thursday night as it was returning to its Quam from a practice bombing run over Okinawa.

## Prosecution Fails to Shake Turman Story

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 24 (AP)—Turman Wilson, 24, one of two brothers accused of kidnapping and slaying Jo Ann Dewey, wound up his story on the witness stand today, unshaken by cross-examination.  
Turman, who has testified for a day and a half in his own defense, told in detail what he and his brother, Utah, 20, did from March 19, the day of the slaying, to March 30, when they were captured in Sacramento, Calif. He said they were in Vancouver at the time the state says the girl was kidnapped.  
His complicated story, involving many trips and many changes of automobiles, remained the same despite repeated cross-examination.  
He testified that he and Utah fled the state, not because they were involved in Jo Ann's slaying, but because Utah feared revocation of his parole. Turman's attempts to tell more of these fears—they involved a purported theft of a power saw—did not get into the record, because of objections by the prosecution.  
Turman left the witness stand only a half-hour before court recessed for the day. The younger brother, Utah, then began relating virtually the same account.  
A new juror was put in today. Harry O. Bushman, Ridgefield, an alternate, took the place of Deane Nehler, who fell ill yesterday.

Louise, 2, and Joe William Wood, 1. Mrs. Wood and the two children were taken to the hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises. Polston suffered a minor head cut and Wood a bruised left arm.

## Board Votes Added Fund for Blind School

Approval of an emergency appropriation of \$50,000 to permit immediate construction of a new school building at the state school for the blind in Salem topped affirmative action of the state emergency board meeting Saturday.  
Among other items, the board approved another \$22,000 in emergency funds, mostly for statute revision, and turned down requests for \$60,000 for a start on state-wide property reappraisal by the tax commission, and for \$24,800 for a new supreme court building library. (Additional details on page 12.)  
Award of the contract for the school building is expected at the board of control meeting this week. Lowest among bids opened June 3 was the \$334,900 by George Jackson company, Portland. Extra funds were sought because only \$300,000 was available from the state building fund. Some will be used for architect's fees and engineering.  
The structure, expected to be ready about next March, will face Mission street between the two dormitories, according to Superintendent Walter Dry. Of mostly one-story construction, with some two-story, it will include only school rooms and auditorium. It will be of reinforced concrete, faced with brick.  
The large frame administration building, which also has housed classes and some employees' quarters, will continue in use for offices and employee housing. Only the first floor can be used, however, because of fire regulations.

## Firemen File Appeal Notice In Demotions

Demands for investigation of their recent demotion in the Salem fire department were filed Saturday by both Ben O. Faught and J. F. Baggett. Date for a hearing before the city civil service commission, which has decided to

hear the case, has not been set yet, according to Chairman W. J. Estess, but probably will be early in July.  
The petitioning letters were filed with the city recorder through the men's attorney, Allan Carson. Both Faught and Baggett were reduced by Chief W. P. Roble from the grade of captain to firemen on grounds of insubordination and discourtesy.

## Salem Eagles Drillers Win

GRANTS PASS, June 24 (AP)—Roy Jewell, The Dalles, was elected president without opposition today at the closing session of the Oregon Eagles convention. Ethel

Vedder, Newberg, is the new president of the Eagles auxiliary. Opal Gardner, Salem, was elected treasurer of the auxiliary at the 35th annual state convention here.

Salem's drill team, captained by S. L. Griffin, beat out Portland, 1949 winner, for the drill championship in competition last night. The Salem team was runner-up two years ago.

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
