

Bureau of Land Management Group to Meet

The new Salem district advisory board for the U. S. bureau of land management will conduct its first meeting at 2 o'clock this afternoon with A. P. Collins, district forester, at his office in the school administration building.

In announcing the meeting, Daniel J. Goldy, regional administrator, pointed out that members are appointed for one year and rotated to keep some experienced man on the board. They are selected as a cross section of interests, including timber owners, loggers, sawmill operators, labor, agriculture, recreational groups and the general public. The bureau's program is aimed at sustaining yield management of timber supply and development of recreational values.

This meeting's considerations are to include new road right-of-way regulations. It will be open to all lumber and logging operators in the district.

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Tax League Asks Rufus Wood Resign

OREGON CITY, June 28.—(AP)—A member of the Clackamas county taxpayers league today demanded that Rufus Wood, county assessor, resign.

The demand was made by Marshall Dana, editor of the editorial page of the Oregon Journal, at a hearing here before the state tax commission.

The league is fighting Wood's property re-assessment program, claiming he raised valuations as much as 450 per cent on some suburban property.

Wood was ordered by the county board of equalization to roll back assessments to the 1949 level, but he appealed to the state tax commission. The commission heard his side of the case at Salem a week ago.

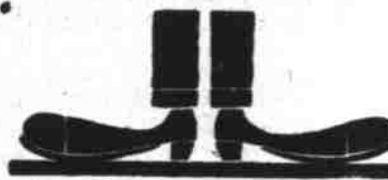
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Portland Hearing Set On Bus Fare Increase

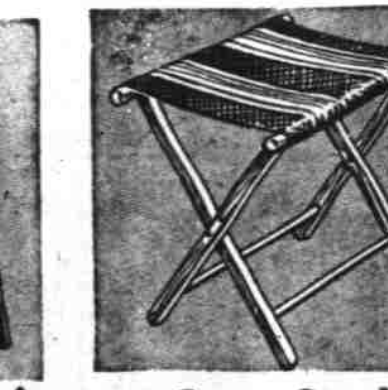
Spring Steel Chair

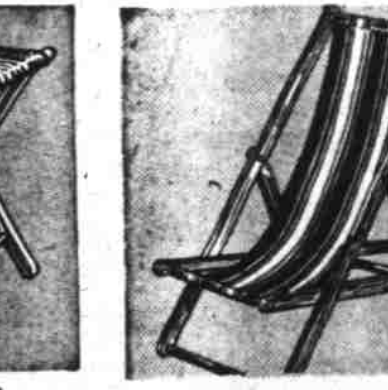
