Cherry Fare

Maraschinos Made, Canning Comes Next; Pickled Cherries Good Too

Cherry pickers, swarming over the landscape, are producing work for local housewives this week.

Maraschino cherry recipes have been in the paper, freezing suggestions have been made, but there are other things to do with sweet cherries.

Whether you can your cherries with or without seeds, (and you should include some without, you'll be glad when eating time comes), you'll find that adding just a little color to light cherries makes them more attractive to look at, and therefore serve.

A medium or heavy syrup is usually recommended for cherries, that is, one part sugar to 2 parts water for medium and equal parts sugar and water for heavy. If brought to a boil in a kettle before packing into hot jars, they should be processed in the hot water bath for 10 minutes. If cold packed, process for 20 minutes.

Most jams and preserves are made from sour cherries, which come along a little later in the season. Sweet cherries, however may be used for several other things. Cherry olives are a pickle-like product which many people favor.

CHERRY OLIVES

Fill quart jars with perfect Royal Ann cherries, leaving stems on. Cover with a mixture of 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup white vinegar and fill up jar with cold water. Screw on lid tight, let stand for at least four weeks before using. May add red or green coloring if desired.

Sweet cherries may be used for this recipe too:

CHERRY ORANGE CONSERVE

4 cups cherries, chopped 1 large orange, shredded coarsely
4 cups sugar
1 can drained crushed pineapple 1 lemon, shredded

Cook orange with a little of the pineapple juice until tender, then add cherries, sugar, pineapple and lemon. Cook until thickened.

SPICED CURRENTS

6 cups sugar 1 pound seeded raisins
2 cups vinegar 1 teaspoon salt
3 quarts currants 1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon all-spice 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
Make a syrup of sugar and vinegar. Add currants and raisins which have been chopped fine. Boil mixture for 30 minutes, add salt and spice, seal in sterilized jars.

Many New Styles in Mirrors Available For Home Decoration, or Any Room

There are many new styles in mirrors that have developed because of their use in homes where an added sparkle and spaciousness is needed for a room. At one time mirrors were very ornate affairs and were not popular in homes that had modern streamlined decor.

However, today the mirror can be used to add depth to a room, and to add a note of splendor that will balance paintings or other decorations. For a simple, typically American home, mirrors with wide simple frames of satiny natural pine are excellent. They go well with American made furniture.

If you like an oriental touch to your mirror, you can buy one with decorated frames of Chinese

origin. For 18th Century rooms, there are new styles of mirrors with gracefully carved frames of mahogany or gold leaf.

The sophisticated type of contemporary room calls for more streamlined mirrors. Wide expanses of etched mirrors without frames and large enough to cover part or all of one wall are becoming popular for modern homes. A mirror topping a mantel and going up the ceiling adds a delightful touch to a room. For a spectacular mirror, you can order a new type with a deep frame covered with dramatic, bright green felt. One young couple I know have a living room in dark green with light touches and have put up a mirror with a white sculptured frame that is all the decoration needed on one long wall.

You need not keep to the oblong mirror for a modern room, but can choose a square or oval shape if that suits the room better.
