Variety Show, Parade to Cap VFW Conclave

A 1½-hour variety show at Sweetland field preceded by a six-division parade through downtown Salem streets tonight will cap activities of the annual VFW convention being held in Salem.

The parade, led by Grand Marshal Gen. Thomas Rilea, state adjutant general, will move from North Commercial and Chemeketa streets at 7 p.m.

Regular army troops and contingents from the national guard marching to the music of the 21st Army band from Fort Lewis and the 231st army band, national guard, will participate in the parade. The 21st band also will play grounds at 3 p.m. and at Sweetland field preceding VFW Varieties.

Units will form at 6:30 p.m. for the parade with a police escort, the grand marshal and staff, color guard and distinguished guests including Gov. Douglas McKay, Mayor R. L. Elstrom, VFW National Vice Commander Frank C. Hilton and Department Commander Vere A. McCarty making up the first division.

The American Legion drum and bugle corps and other patriotic organizations will march in the fourth division, with the Jefferson high school band, civic organizations and mounted units in the fifth. Decorated commercial floats and automobiles will comprise the last division.

The parade will follow Commercial to State street, from State to High to Court to Church and back to State. The parade will disband at Winter street and Sweetland field, site of the "VFW Varieties."

The variety show will begin at 8 p.m. at the field. Bryce Santry of Norman Anderson Productions in Portland will put comedy into his duties as master of ceremonies. Included in the show will be acts by Happy Tom and Jerry, skating

Stockpiles of U. S. Minerals Said Too Small

Warning that America's stockpiles of strategic minerals are too small to cope with a serious international emergency came from F. W. Libbey, director of the state department of geology and mineral industries, at a meeting of Governor Douglas McKay's advisory committee on natural resources here Thursday.

Libbey estimated that the United States supply of manganese, used largely in the manufacture of steel, would be exhausted in less than a year by demands incident to this nation's building of a war machine.

The U. S. Bureau of Mines, Libbey said, is doing everything possible within its appropriation but the policy of the federal government, particularly the state department, is discouraging to new industry in the field of strategic minerals.

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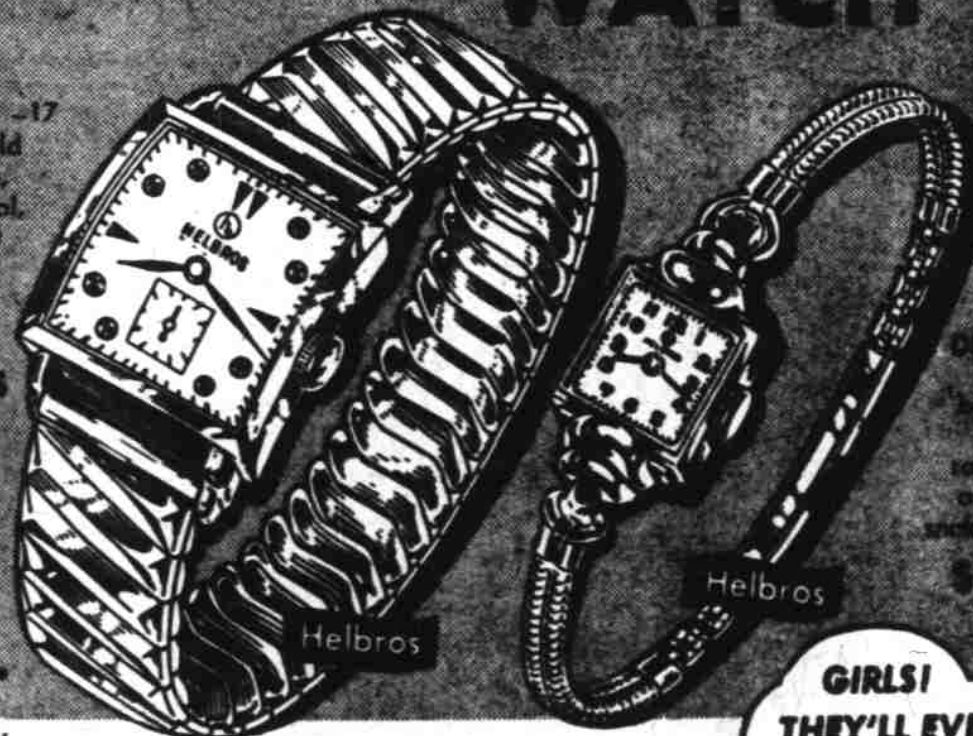
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
