

Tri-City Whammy Still Good; We Lose 10-3; 40-Lap Mainer Caps 'Rod' Races Tonight

Buccola Bangs 2 Home Runs

Liska, Burak Yield 16 Hits; Help Due

The fast-fading town-Senators have been able to lick the Tri-City Braves only once in nine tries this season, and from the way they looked in dropping a 10-3 nod to Mgr. Charley Peterson's stalwarts last night at Waters field, the lone victory may be the only one they'll get this whole season.

A woe-filled combination of 16 enemy base hits, including a pair of well-timed home runs by Vic Buccola over the right field fence, and five Senator errors spoiled the "Salem Elks Night" show for the 974 patrons, not to mention the couple-hundred "Third Base Club" kiddies.

Apparently headed for the WILL stadium pell mell, the club is to secure additional player help soon. So stated Gen. Mgr. George Emigh following last night's debacle, the team's fourth straight loss. New outfielder Al Drew, picked up following his release at Wenatchee, reported last night and played right field. To make room for him Orrin Snyder was released outright.

Emigh and Manager Ad Liska went seriously into a huddle following the game outcome of which may be known "in a day or two," according to Emigh.

Liska himself chose the enemy from the mound to start with in the series opener, but it was apparent almost from the start that the popular skipper didn't have his stuff. He took himself out after five frames and was trailing by a 5-2 count when he handed the chores to Johnny Burak. Five runs on six base hits came crashing down on the right handed sophomore in the eighth frame.

All the while Long Jim McCollum, who like one Johnny Marshall would simply love to pitch against Salem teams for a living—would get rich doing it—breezed along for the triumph. He was touched for seven hits, but it may as well have been 17 the way his mates were scoring runs for him.

The locals did manage to score first, in the opening half, when McCollum walked Dick Bartle and Moe Wesley followed with a 375-foot triple to right-center.

Tri-City banged across a trio in the third, but only one was earned as two of the five Salem boppers reared up in the frame. Liska fanned McCollum to start with but Al Spaeter, now leading the Braves club in hitting with a fancy .319 average, lined a single to right. Buccola bounced nicely to Bartle at first, but Wally Scott missed Bartle's forefoot toss to second and the rally was on. Jim Warner walked to load the sacks and Dick Faber shot a single to right for two runs. Bud Peterson then walked to again 'bud' 'em up, and when Scott dropped Nick Pesut's infield fly pop-up in ramblent Warner.

Buccola's first homer, in the fifth, Faber's triple and Peterson's fly-out netted two more runs and a 5-1 Tri-City lead.

Salem got one back in the fifth on a walk to Gene Gaviglio, Scott's single, Bus McMillan's pinch-hit ground out, Drew's pop out and Wayne Peterson's hard single to center.

Wesley's single and Bill Beard's line double rang in the final Salem counter in the sixth.

Tri-City's big eighth frame explosion started with one out. Peterson singled sharply to right, romped to second on a wild pitch, and scored on Neil Bryant's single to center. Then Meri Frick, a pitcher playing right field for the Braves in place of Clint Cameron, hit a 390-foot triple against the center field fence, just beneath the scoreboard. He scored when McCollum flied out. Spaeter then singled and Buccola lined a terrific smash over the fence for his second homer.

It was a display of real power hitting something sadly lacking on the home side.

Puccola led the 16-hit barrage with four bingles for 10 bases. Only Wesley, with his triple and single could dent McCollum appreciably for the locals.

The Senators did come through with three double plays to give 'em a total of '67 to date.

In tonight's second game it will be Bill Osborn for the Liskas against Gene Roemer for the Petersons. Roemer is leading the league in pitching with a 7-0 record.

Mathias Leads 'Decath'

TULARE, Calif., June 30 (AP)—Defending Champion Bob Mathias regained the lead at the end of seven of the 10 events in the hotly contested National Decathlon Championship tonight.

Mathias, seeking his third straight crown, gained back the advantage over Bill Albans of North Carolina in one of his stronger events, the discus. It gave Mathias a commanding position in the competition.

Trailing by 210 points to Albans after the sixth event, the high hurdles, Mathias threw the discus 146 feet 5 inches. It gave him 854 points and a total of 6,066, 74 ahead of Albans.

Albans, notably weak in this event, threw the discus 114 feet 11 1/2 inches for 570 points and a total of 5,992.

Remaining to be contested were the pole vault, javelin throw and 1500-meter run.

Oley Scruggs, 21-year-old Santa Barbara college Negro, remained in third place with 5,378 points after seven events. Wilford (Whizzer) White, Arizona State at Tempe, had 5,163 points (16.2 in the hurdles and 110 feet 7 1/2 inches in the discus).

Twenty-two Roadsters Slated for Program

The hot rods — twenty-two of them — invade Salem's Hollywood Bowl tonight for the Valley Sports outfit's regular Saturday night auto racing program. A 40-lap main event, longest of the local racing season to date, will cap the program. Time trials will start at eight o'clock and will be followed in order by a 3-lap trophy

It was announced last night that a special match race of five laps for a \$25 bet will be added to the racing program. Owner Charley Heitz of the No. 1 car, usually piloted by Ernie Koch, and Owner Elliott Compton of the No. 27 driven by Len Sutton will drive their own cars in the match event. Elliott made the challenge and Heitz accepted. Neither are regular drivers and consider themselves as "green peas" at actual race driving. The No. 1 and 27 cars are reputedly the fastest "rods" in the Northwest.
