

Army Issues First Casualty List From Korea, Families Told News

WASHINGTON, July 2-(P)—The army today gave out its first official casualty list of the campaign in Korea.

It named 11 officers and men missing after the crash of a transport plane carrying them from Japan to south Korea. None was from the Pacific northwest.

The army gave no details, and whether the plane crash referred to was one announced in Tokyo yesterday. The Far East air force said then that a C-54 transport carrying 23 persons had crashed near Pusan, south Korea.

Far East air force headquarters said the C-54 was carrying a crew of five and 18 passengers, and that there were no survivors.

An air force spokesman said in Washington today that it is not known here whether any air force personnel other than the five crewmen referred to were lost in that crash.

Names Unannounced

The air force has not yet announced the names of the five crewmen.

The army announcement today gave no details except to say that the airplane on which 11 officers and men were reported missing is believed to have been lost while attempting to land.

NEW CASTLE, Ind., July 2-(P)—The war in Korea came home to the village of Greensboro today.

Cpl. Richard E. Mills, the grocer's stepson, was reported missing after a transport plane crash—the first Hoosier casualty of the Korean war. The army merely said the plane is believed to have crashed trying to land on a flight from Japan to south Korea.

"I knew something was going to happen to him," sobbed his mother, Mrs. Fred Pope. "I've felt it ever since this thing started."

Deputy Sheriff Cash Robinson of New Castle delivered the telegram for the army to Mrs. Pope in the living room behind her husband's grocery store.

Confidence Shown

"Dick always had more luck than any other 10 men," his brother, Charles, said. "I know he'll get home all right."

Dick had felt the same way. His mother said he didn't apply for any life insurance when he enlisted.

"I'm coming back," he had said, confidently.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., July 2-(P)—"He just did his duty, and I'm proud of him."

This was the reaction of the mother of Cpl. Raymond G. Morrissey, 22, upon learning that her son was reported missing among the first casualties of the Korean campaign.

Planned Army Career

The mother, Mrs. Charlotte Jackson, 44, said her son liked the army and had planned to make a career of it. He had served in the signal corps since enlisting in 1946 and had been stationed in Tokyo for the last three years. He was a lineman and transmitter repairman with a signal service battalion.

Mrs. Jackson said she last heard from her son in May, but "he wasn't very good about writing." She has three more sons and she said she won't stand in the way if the oldest, Delmar, 19, decides to enlist.

She is the wife of a parking lot attendant. Her first husband died several years ago.

North Korean Tank Columns Strike South

TOKYO, Monday, July 3-(P)—Four North Korean columns, at least two of them led by tanks, struck southward today toward U.S. infantry moving up swiftly to meet them south of fallen Seoul.

A headquarters spokesman at Taejon said the two new columns crossed over the broad Han on a repaired railway bridge. The South Koreans blew the bridge in their retreat from Seoul.

The spokesman said one of the columns was led by two tanks and the other by four tanks.

American air forces attacked at least one of the North Korean spearheads.

American B-29 bombers of the 20th air force meanwhile heavily raided the North Korean airfield at Yonpo, 135 miles inside North Korea.

They were escorted by 14 Royal Australian air force Mustangs, in action for the first time in defense of the southern republic. The Australians also accompanied American F-80's and B-26's to the Seoul area.

A South Korean forward observer relayed a report to the American field headquarters that the Northern Koreans had concentrated 30 to 40 tanks at the Seoul airstrip. Significantly, this is south of the Han river.

Solons Unveil Racing News Distributors

WASHINGTON, July 2-(P)—A Senate committee today unveiled a bulky report designed "to show the pattern of race news distribution which is reaching the bookies" over the nation.

That pattern reaches into Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and British Columbia.

The committee listed the names of more than 2,000 firms and persons who receive or distribute race news over an intricate network of telegraph and telephone lines fanning out from Chicago.

Senator McFarland (D-Ariz.), who directed compiling of the report, told reporters he has no doubt that some of those listed are in the bookmaking business. However, he emphasized that many others named were legitimate users of racing news who haven't even a remote connection with gambling of any kind.

Valuable to Police

He added the report would be valuable to local police officers if they wished to trace back the names "to find out some of the bookie operations."

The report is available to anyone who sends \$2.75 to the Department of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C.

The report grew out of commerce subcommittee hearings on estimates to do a \$3,000,000-\$5,000,000 undercover business annually.

The report contains maps showing the race wire circuits of Continental Press Service of Cleveland, O., and race wire lines leased from Western Union.

Major Distributor

The commerce committee has named Continental as the major distributor of racing news which reaches the bookies—and has said in a report Continental has a virtual monopoly in the business. Continental's operating center is in Chicago.

Seattle was listed in the report as one of the distributing points on the Continental Chicago circuits.

From Seattle there are relays to Portland and Klamath Falls, Vancouver, Wash., and Vancouver, B. C., Helena Mont., and Post Falls, Idaho.

WASHINGTON, July 2-(P)—The Farwest Publishing Co., of Seattle, was listed by the Senate Commerce committee today as Pacific Northwest's principal purchaser and distributor of racing, baseball and other sports news.

McCarthy Says Koreans Given 'Baling Wire'

WASHINGTON, July 2-(P)—Senator McCarthy declared today that "American boys are dying in Korea" because "a group of untouchables in the state department sabotaged" the aid program which congress voted for Korea.

The Wisconsin republican said all the South Koreans got for the money provided by congress for arms aid was "about \$52,000 worth of baling wire."

McCarthy said the state department harbors "communists or worse."

But he named no names when asked to be specific regarding that point during a television interview (NBC, Meet the Press.)

A senate foreign relations subcommittee has been investigating McCarthy's charges that the state department is infested by communists and their sympathizers.

Fires Criticism

McCarthy fired bitter new criticism today at Secretary of State Acheson. He said that until the present crisis developed in the Far East Acheson had been "telling the world" that the United States would not interfere in Korea.

McCarthy said that was a more effective sabotage of American foreign policy than anything else. Only \$500 for Morse

On other subjects discussed during the interview, McCarthy:

1. Declared it was entirely ethical for him to accept \$10,000 from the Lustron Corp., now bankrupt prefabricated housing firm, for writing a booklet on housing. McCarthy said his action was just as ethical as it is for Vice President Barkley to accept \$5,000 for a speech or for Senator Morse (R-Ore.) to accept \$500 for a speech.

2. Refused to discuss what his interviewers described as reports that he had lost from \$2,000 to \$25,000 a year in the stock market.

3. Said that to the best of his knowledge he is having no state income tax trouble in Wisconsin. His interviewers had asked about published reports that he may be asked for further income data.

Paying Investigators

4. Disclosed that he is paying his private investigators in the senate communist inquiry from \$25 to \$30 a day, plus expenses. He said he has four investigators working full time and one working half-time in this country and another full time in Europe. McCarthy said he is paying their salaries with "help from some of my friends" and through "voluntary contributions."

5. Described the democratic-controlled senate committee's investigation of his communist-investigation charges as "the most fantastic exhibition I have ever seen put on."

Holiday Travel Depopulates City

At least 314 persons died celebrating the July Fourth holiday weekend—a full day before Independence day was to begin.

Deaths from accidents climbed steadily Sunday night with the toll from traffic mishaps mounting to 215 at midnight. In addition, 62 died by drowning and 96 were killed in miscellaneous accidents.

There was only one death from fireworks.

North Koreans To Confiscate Businesses

TOKYO, Monday, July 3-(P)—The communist-controlled radio in captured Seoul announced today that the North Korean Reds would confiscate all property owned by the South Korean government, its officials and "monopolistic capitalists."

The broadcast said the following proclamation had been issued July 1 by a "peoples (communist) committee" formed after Seoul's capture by the North Korean army:

"Factories and all properties owned by the Japanese prior to the liberation of Korea in 1945 shall be considered enemy property and shall be confiscated."

"Properties owned by the Rhee (South Korean President Syngman Rhee) government, by officials of the Rhee government and by monopolistic capitalists shall be considered anti-national traitors' property and likewise confiscated and placed under government control."

"People in possession of the above mentioned property must report at once. Anyone not conforming with the proclamation shall be severely punished."

ERUPTION EXPECTED

JAKARTA, Indonesia, July 2-(P)—a major eruption of west Java's Tangkuban Frahu volcano is expected any hour, W. A. Petrouchewski, volcanic expert, said today. One of the cones within the 7,300-foot high volcano's crater has tripled its temperature within the last few days and has started a minor eruption which is certain to increase in violence, Petrouchewski said.

RIVERS TO RISE AGAIN

PORTLAND, July 2-(P)—Continued warm weather in the Columbia and Willamette river watersheds increased the flow in those streams Sunday, but damaging floods were not expected.

The Columbia touched 24.1 feet, more than a foot below last week's damaging crest.

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Korean Rains Keep Troop Planes Aloft

TOKYO, July 2-(P)—Transport planes carrying the first American combat troops to South Korea circled their destination for six hours before a landing could be made through thick clouds and rain.

This was disclosed today by an authoritative source.

American fighters maintained constant cover to protect the lumbering transports from North Korean planes. A spokesman for the Far East air forces said, nevertheless, the airlift was handled without accident although it was known the weather turned back at last one plane.

The transports, loaded with troops in full combat dress, took off from a southern Japanese air base in the rain. They encountered increasing cloudiness as they crossed the Straits of Tsushima, the source said. Upon arrival at Korea the pilots found the field completely obscured.

This source said the actual landing was several hours after it was reported by news correspondents, none of whom was able to get to the destination of the troops or to obtain information from headquarters.

The American movement northward toward battle positions consequently was delayed long after the original schedule.

Flying Saucers, Atomic Wings On Sale in Salem Over Holiday

Skyrockets, sparklers, atomic wings and flying saucers went on sale in Salem over the week end, but police, fire and first aid men reported no trouble from the noise-makers during the first two days of their sale in the city.

Suburban stands have been selling fireworks since June 20. Shooting them inside the city limits will be legal on the Fourth of July only.

And from the size of the stocks on hand in the 20-or-more places selling them in the Salem area, it's going to be a noisy holiday unless the vendors get caught with a lot of stock on the shelf.

Some dealers said Sunday night that sales hadn't been up to expectation yet, but they looked for business to boom today and tomorrow.

Heavy Sales Reported

One dealer reported several \$25 sales already. A highway stand said business was brisk from tourists from California where firecrackers are banned.

"They just buy enough noise-makers to shoot between here and the border, but some buy \$20 to \$40 of night fireworks to take home, he said.

Another seller said the stock moved faster when the parents came along. "Kids buy about 50 cents to a dollar's worth and take a lot of time deciding," he said, "but the folks usually buy at least \$5 to \$10 worth in a hurry."

Low on Saucers

Most stocks didn't look like they had a dent in them Sunday night, but one place was out of colored sparklers and another was running low on flying saucers.

The saucer (price about 50c) is a propeller driven charge that reportedly whirls more than 300 feet in the air before exploding.

The most expensive item this year is something called "star mine" which sells for a cool \$5.

"It's supposed to be very beautiful at night," said the dealer. "I can't afford to sample one."

Most stands are getting lots of calls for the band, high-powered items, variously known as cherry bombs, M-80s, and t.n.t. bombs.

Heavy Salutes

The most powerful charge you can buy in Salem sells for less than a nickel and is about as powerful as the red, two-inch salutes which have been on the market for years.

At one stand practical jokers were laying in a big stock of auto tire and spark plug gadgets to surprise unwary motorists.

Torpedoes and the little, red "scratches" are also on the banned list, but the recent cowboy craze has made cap guns a best-seller. Some of them are fancier
