The defeat dumped the Dodgers out of third place into fourth, with the Boston Braves moving into third. The Braves took a doubleheader from the New York Giants, 11-5 and 6-3.
Big George Munger batted and pitched the Cards to their victory over the Pirates. Munger doubled home the Cards' first run and then scored the second and winning run on a double by Tommy Glaviano in the sixth inning. Al Brazie yielded Pittsburgh's lone run, an eighth-inning homer by Ralph Kiner.
Home runs featured Boston's victories over the Giants. In the opener, Buddy Kerr, Walker Cooper and Bob Elliott connected. Sid Gordon won the nightcap by slamming a three-run homer in the ninth.
Fifth place from the Giants as fifth place from the Cardinals, as Monk Dubiel pitched the Cubs to a 16-0, four-hit decision over the Cincinnati Reds.
Philadelphia dumped Washington 7-4. The A's clinched the game with a five-run blast in the third against Bob Kuzava.
The Chicago White Sox tied Washington for fifth place by dividing a doubleheader with St. Louis. Ray Scarborough pitched the Sox to a 5-2 win in the first game but the Browns won the second, 4-3, in 11 innings.

Salem's Bob Steinbrook and Woodburn's Diller gave batters of both teams a meager four-hit diet over the seven-inning route. Steinbrook yielded to Steve Merchant in the sixth after being hit on the hand by a batted ball. He had allowed only one hit up to that point. Merchant scooted the rest of the way without yielding a blow.
Bill Hanauska's nine managed only three hits off Diller but they made them pay off in the fourth when Bill Nelson contributed a triple behind Jones and Elmer Haugen followed with a single. Haugen also rapped a triple but it went for naught in the second Diller struck out seven, walked one and hit one.
