Street Work Planned by City Council

MT. ANGEL — Franklin, Gillis and East Church streets in Mt. Angel are to be improved as soon as the work can be arranged, it was decided by the city council Monday night. East Church, between Garfield and the SP tracks will be paved; Franklin, from the state highway to the intersection with Monroe will be graded and graveled; and Gillis, from College south to the academy, will likewise be graded and graveled.

The action followed the presentation to the council by petitions signed by the property owners along the routes of all three streets. The street committee was instructed to confer with the county engineer at once to make the necessary arrangements.

John Helt appeared before the council with an offer from himself and Andrew Dummer to convert the present unsightly grounds around the city pump house on College street across from the Helt and Dummer homes to an attractive spot with shrubs, flowers and lawn if the city would clean out the brush and fill in to level the ground.

A discussion about fire hazards on Leo street resulted in a decision to have the recorder write to the PGE to remove brush and other debris from its right of way.

William Predeck appeared before the council and accepted the appointment of building inspector, a new city office resulting from the recently passed city ordinance. He left his wages up to the council.

Fire Chief Joseph Berchold reported 11 fires during the first six months of the year, six in the city, four rural and one mutual aid fire in Silverton. City Police Ed Korte reported 14 arrests during the month of June, all traffic violations.

A special meeting of the council to accept the city budget was announced for Thursday night, July 6.
