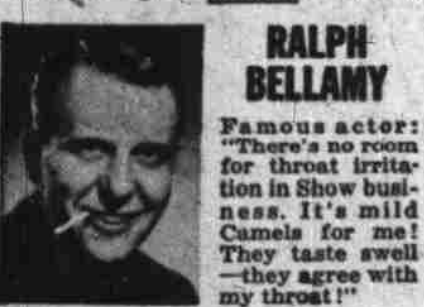

Filbert Tariff Backing Told

Oregon filbert growers were advised of support from U. S. Rep. Walter Norblad of Oregon's first district, over the filbert tariff issue.

Norblad sent word Wednesday from Washington, D. C., that he has warned Secretary of State Dean Acheson that a contemplated reduction of filbert tariff by 50 per cent "might spell an end to the U. S. filbert industry." Norblad said domestic growers' costs are high and operations are already marginal due to foreign competition.

Services will be held Saturday at 2 p. m. at the Virgil T. Golden chapel with the Rev. G. Wesley Turner officiating. Interment will be at Claggett cemetery.

Dallas Cherry Growers Call For Pickers

Start of the cherry season in the Dallas area brought a new urgency Wednesday to pleas for cherry pickers. The state employment service said 1,000 more pickers were needed at Dallas and 400-500 more around Salem.

With the Polk county crop reported to be one of the heaviest on record, the Salem employment office opened a temporary branch in the courthouse at Dallas, in charge of Albert Melious and County Agent John Hansen.

Trucks leave the Salem office from 6 to 7:30 a. m. daily, said Manager W. H. Baillie, and pickers can get directions to orchards from the office. Orders are coming in already for pie cherries, boysenberries and raspberries, which do not double up with the cherry crop as a rule.

Meter Feeders Being Checked By Police; Mayor Solicits Aid

Salem police are listing this city's habitual "meter feeders," it was reported to fellow businessmen in a letter this week from Mayor R. L. Elfstrom.

Elfstrom urged further cooperation among business leaders and their employees in the campaign to relieve parking conditions by not using parking meters for periods longer than the law allows. Red flags on the meters show as "violation" when parking time paid for has expired. But actual checking of automobiles is necessary to determine if a parker is using (and paying for) more time than the stated limit for parking in a given block. Some areas are limited to one-hour parking, others to two hours or other designated periods.

The mayor's letter follows: "I am writing this letter of appeal to you on a personal basis in a determined effort to seek your cooperation on an extremely vital problem which is confronting the City of Salem.

"As you are undoubtedly aware, the parking problem in downtown Salem has reached a point of utmost concern. Various programs have been instituted by city officials and committees of citizens to relieve this all-important problem. This problem will be greatly alleviated if we cooperate in our efforts to stop meter feeding by both mercantile and professional men and their employees.

Since Fred Minifie wrote from St. Louis about our travel adventures, we had seen many outstanding things which none of the fellows will ever forget.

I, myself, felt that the outstanding things we saw up to Washington, D.C., were Yellowstone park and the opera "Rosalie" at the beautiful municipal arena in St. Louis. It holds 10,000 people very comfortably and is situated in a bowl on a hillside up near the famous zoo and amusement park. The stage is surrounded by some beautiful trees which are heavily insured. Many of the boys said that the excellent comedy was the high point.

Gary Messing of Keizer troop 41 said that he "liked the swimming pool at St. Louis the best." Of the weather was so terribly warm.

The humidity was so very high that the boys got back aboard the train, stripped to their shorts and threw wet towels over their shoulders to take off the heat. Our travel uniforms became so dirty that they could stand in a corner by themselves. Now we can get them cleaned at Valley Forge.

Seed Company To Open New Plant Facilities

The Jenks-White Seed company soon will open a new, modern cleaning plant and warehouse at 761 Murdock st. in west Salem.

A company spokesman said the plant, located near the Southern Pacific railroad to facilitate shipping, would be ready to receive seed when the approaching harvest begins.

The plant will specialize in processing all grass seeds and legumes such as clovers, Austrian winter peas and vetches. Elmer Morley, an experienced operator, will be in charge of the new plant which has 10,000 square feet of warehouse space and the latest cleaning equipment.

The Jenks-White company has been a pioneer in the seed business in the Willamette valley and has branches in other towns.

The home office will remain at 265 State st., where the organization started nearly 30 years ago.

District Judge Ruling Cleared

Oregon counties which have reached 50,000 population, based on the recent federal census, are entitled to a district judge, to be located in the county seat of such counties, Attorney General George Neuner ruled Wednesday.

The opinion was sought by Frank VanDyke, Medford, speaker of the house of representatives.

The justice of the peace districts shall be reapportioned by the county courts with the justice of the peace district involving the county seats abolished.

The district judge must be a member of the state bar and shall receive a salary of \$5,000 a year. Until the district judge is selected the justice of the peace of the county seat district would serve as district judge.
