Larger Women Now Have Special Styles, All Sizes, Half-Sizes Available

If you are a size 18 or over, it might be heartening to know that 35 per cent of the women in this country are in the same boat. Despite the fact that heavier figures exist in such large numbers, they have been neglected while many a slim girl can find countless attractive costumes. However, you will find that more and more manufacturers are putting in larger sizes and the styles for half-sizes and extra sizes are getting more attention every season.

Until about 35 years ago, garments made for the larger woman were all based on the perfect 36. Others had to have their clothes made to order. Then a mechanical engineer married an

enthusiastic designer of maternity clothes and became interested in the problem of designing clothes for women with larger figures. He started a new size range as the result of measuring hundreds of larger women. The range was sizes 36 to 56.

The fashion coordinator of a company that has long specialized in stylish stouts says you can approach lines, fabric and color from an engineer's scientific point of view. Fabrics for the larger figure should be smooth and malleable, never the draped nubby wools or heavy starched cottons. Lines should emphasize the vertical rather than the horizontal, to create an illusion of a taller and slimmer figure. Dark clothes do make a person look slimmer, but a becoming shade can do more for a heavier person, provided it is not too vivid or bright. Often you will find the larger print more proportion-wise for a big woman.
