Salem Superintendent of Mails Retires After 37 Year Service

Nearly everything has happened in July for Edgar B. Daugherty, from the time he started working in Salem postoffice in 1913 until he retired this week as superintendent of mails. His successor is Charles Eyre, assistant superintendent since 1944 and postal employee here since 1923.

Daugherty was appointed a sub-clerk at 35 cents per hour (barely one-quarter the present starting wage) on July 12, 1913. The next July 6 he became a regular clerk at \$800 per year. He was advanced to superintendent on July 1, 1922, and retired voluntarily July 1.

Not only will Daugherty be missed from the postoffice, but also the bicycle he always rode to work. The current one he has used for 26 years, and still prefers it, though having a 1949 car. He is proud of having beat a car from home to the postoffice a few years ago.

Residing at 1632 Court st., Daugherty also plans to occupy his time at a small acreage near Salem and at a cabin on the Little North fork of the Santiam river. He contends he'll let Mrs. Daugherty support him now.

Other promotions announced by Postmaster Albert C. Gragg as a result of the retirement include Duane Gibson from foreman to assistant superintendent, Reece H. Jones from clerk in charge to foreman and Harmon J. Garrett from carrier to clerk in charge.

J. M. Mjolsness Returns from ARC Conclave

The American Red Cross has an important role in the civilian defense program, according to J. M. Mjolsness, state relations officer for the Red Cross, who returned to Salem from the organization's national convention in Detroit, Mich.

Stuart Symington, of the national security resources board, a speaker at the convention, called on the Red Cross to train 20,000,000 persons in first aid this year and to give greater emphasis to the blood, home nursing and disaster programs as necessary phases in civilian defense.

Mjolsness reported three more blood centers are to be opened soon by the national Red Cross, bringing the total to 36 throughout the nation. During the past year the centers supplied more than 720,000 pints of blood, given free to all in need of it in times of emergency illness and disaster.

Auditions for Horace Heidt Show Slated

Auditions are set for July 26 and 27 for Salem performers to appear with the Horace Heidt talent show August 5 in Salem high school auditorium.

A Heidt talent scout will conduct the tryouts at the KOCO studios at 8 p.m. on each audition day, according to E. J. Church, vice chairman of the Marion county chapter for infantile paralysis, sponsor of the Heidt show here.

No advance application is required of aspirants. Eligible are either amateur or professional musical talent, at least 14 years old. Group size is limited to four. All must provide their own accompanist and music.

The local polio benefit show announcement coincided with news from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis that a record total of \$30,783,000 was contributed in the January March of Dimes across the nation, and that this fund is being spent "at an unprecedented rate" to fight polio.

In 1949 the national drive collected \$25,728,000 and an emergency appeal for another \$4,000,000 was necessary to completely finance the aid to 42,375 new polio patients.

It was reported that the number of new cases this year is slightly higher than last year at this time.

More than 140,000 families have completed payments on Farmers Home Administration loans.
