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Keeping Up Berries Come Along Most Any Time, Canning Instructions Must Keep Up

It's pretty hard for a writer on foods to go along with the fruit season. While women in the lower valley are demanding recipes for loganberries, those in the hills are frantically looking for the recipes on strawberries published several weeks ago. Some women are still making maraschino cherries, others have long since put their's away until the bleaching process is completed. Even currant stason has passed for some home canners. Now take berries. Raspberries are gone for some (and we are among them) but for others, the recipes are still good. Here is a jam recipe which does for all berries (straws excluded). It makes a thick jam that can be cut with a knife. Use blackberries, raspberries or logans, boysens or young berries. We've had it in before this year, but repeat it here for late berries.

STIRRED JAM
3 cups crushed berries 3 cups sugar
Bring berries to hard boil, let boil for two minutes. Add sugar and stir until it is dissolved, boil again hard for one minute. Then turn down the heat to low, and cook again for 5 minutes, beating all the time. It thickens as it is beaten. A flat wire whip is ideal for the whipping.

All these berries which are popular for pies, may be frozen with or without sugar. Pie cherries are the same, pit them and put into the freezer cartons, using either no sugar or about half cup to each quart of fruit. Sweeten as needed when the pies are made.

I like to freeze some pies, too. It is a good time saver. Last year, picking only enough wild blackberries for two or three pies, I put them directly into the shells and froze them, the result was a happy one.

Here's a beverage using loganberries. Though I haven't made it, I know those who have and they say it's food.

LOGANBERRY DRINK
Mash two quarts loganberries with 2 quarts cold water to which 4 ounces tartaric acid has been added. Let stand 24 hours then drain. Do not squeeze the fruit. To each two pints juice, add 3 pints sugar. Stir until sugar is dissolved and bottle. Do not heat. When ready to use, dilute to taste.
