Clearing for Blind School Project Made

Clearing of trees preparatory to start of construction of the new blind school building was underway Thursday, Superintendent Walter Dry reported.

The \$334,900 structure will rise on Mission street between the

boys' and girls' dormitories at the school. The building will be of reinforced concrete, faced with brick, and will include school rooms and an auditorium.

Clearing for the building has necessitated removal of about 20 trees from the site, Dry said. Tree cutting and removal of roots is expected to be completed about July 15 with actual construction to start immediately thereafter.
