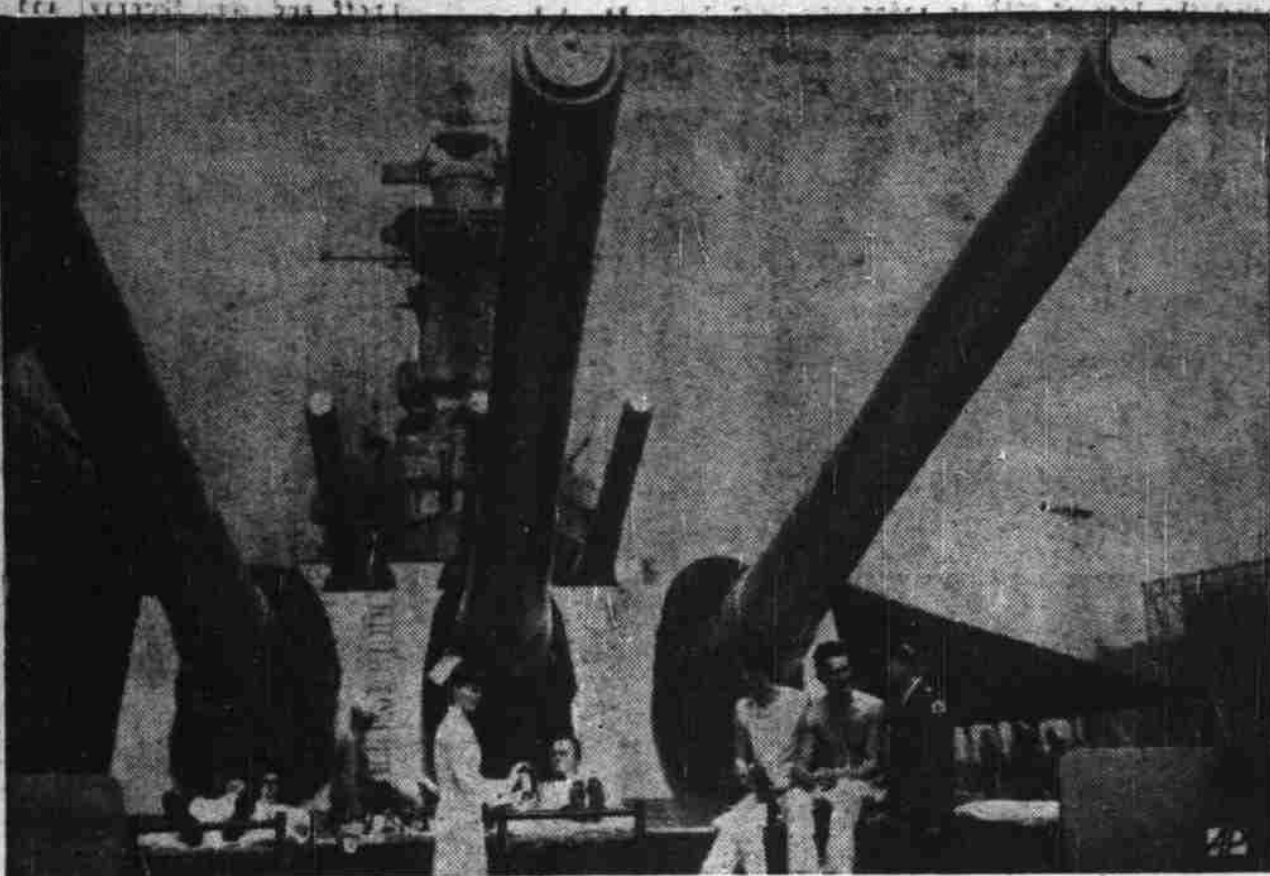

Fred Oliver Baker
ALBANY — Fred Oliver Baker, 66, died at his home in East Albany Tuesday, July 4. Funeral arrangements are being made by the Fortmiller - Fredericksen morticians, with the time to be announced later.
Baker was born Sept. 30, 1883, in Rolf, Iowa. In 1904 he moved to Dutton, Mont., where he lived until 1919 when he moved to Dallas and the following year to Salem and then to Scio. In 1930 he moved to Albany where he has since resided. He was a member of the Grace Mennonite church.
In Des Moines, Iowa, on June 25, 1925, Baker married Anna May Burt. She died in Albany on Oct. 12, 1948. For many years prior to the death of Mrs. Baker, Mr. Baker and his wife operated the Baker Home studio and printing shop, specializing in pictures of school children and the printing of year-books for various organizations.
Baker is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Phil Moore of Albany, a brother, Frank Baker of Sumas, Wash.; a sister, Miss Ella Baker of Des Moines, Iowa; and four grandchildren, Phyllis, Sharron, Nancy and William Moore, all of Albany.

Selmar W. Larsen
ALBANY — Selmar William Larsen, 42, of Albany, died in Everett, Wash., Sunday, July 2, following an emergency operation. Funeral services were held from the Fortmiller-Fredericksen Chapel in Albany Thursday. The Rev. James Kingsley officiated. Burial was in Riverside where graveside services were conducted by the Masonic lodge. Larsen had been on a vacation trip when he was taken ill.
Born Jan. 25, 1908, in Moscow, Idaho, Larsen came to Albany in 1914, but had also lived in Salem for a time, and while there was active in the Salem Junior Chamber of Commerce.
For the past several years he had been in the mercantile business in Albany, first in the variety store business and more recently as owner of the Jack & Jill Deb shop. He was a member of St. John's lodge 17, AF & AM; Al Kadar Shrine, Portland; BPOE lodge 359; and of St. Peter's Episcopal church.
On July 25, 1926, at Jefferson, Larsen married Eudora McAlpin of Albany, who survives. Surviving also is a son, Gerald of Albany; a brother Harold Larsen of Seattle, Wash.; a sister Mrs. James Burrell of Salem, his father L. T. Larsen of McMinnville, and a grandson Steven Larsen of Albany.
