In Wide Variety

Each Home Freezing Expert Chooses Locker Containers Best Suiting Needs

It doesn't make so much difference what sort of containers you do your freezing in, just so they are airtight. There are several reasons for selecting a certain type container. The cost, reusability, ability to be stacked in locker economically and ease of storing when empty (if this is a factor).

The rectangular collapsible boxes with or without liners are, as we know, used commercially by most packers of fruit and vegetables. They are less costly than some, are economical in space, but are not so easily reused. The square waxed type box with liners are excellent, pack in the lockers with maximum of economy in space and can be used many times. They do, however, take up lots of space when being stored empty as they do not collapse nor fit inside each other. The liners need to be replaced but are inexpensive.

Then there are several types heavily waxed containers which require no liners. Tub types are useable for many years, and although they do not pile up economically in the locker, they do allow for air space around. They store easily and economically when empty. Some have transparent tops, which require no labels and therefore look better when used for different kinds of food in successive years.

Glass jars for freezing have been put out by the larger glass jar manufacturers to save a large industry from near extinction. Frozen foods have made such inroads on canning, that sale of glass fruit jars has gone down alarmingly.

The jars have tapering sides for easy removal of food, and of course can be used for years. Their chief objection is that they take up lots of space either empty or full and are inclined to slide around when frosty. They are comparatively expensive to purchase, but over a period of years would be economical.

Plastic film bags are excellent for dry packed vegetables, meats, fish and poultry. You place the food inside and twist ends then fasten with rubber bands. Other types bags are available too, double waxed paper, cellophane which are practical for packing into small places in the locker.

Coffee tins or other cans with tight-fitting covers do well for some types food. Liquid packs of fish or dry packs will be good in them, however the ordinary vegetable or fruits should not go into the tin unless lined with locker paper.

Wrapping materials for meats should be moisture proof to keep food's moisture in and air out. Cellophane, aluminum foil (can be heated in this), or waxed, locker papers are satisfactory. The food however should be double wrapped when paper is used. This means two separate wraps, not merely a double thickness of paper. Waxed side goes next to food.

Check with your dealer when making replacements, he may have some new types container better suited to your needs.
